FEDERAL BYE-ELECTIONS.

As Sir Wilfrid Laurier has still a large majority in the House of Commons, the Liberal Conservative Party had practically little to gain by opposing the Government candidates in the recent bye-elections. So the greater number of these elections went by acclamation. Those who oppose the Government in their respective districts prefer to await the general election when the arch-deceivers will be swept out of power. That the Laurier-Tarte organs have drawn the conclusion, and attempted to make the people believe it true, that the government is still too popular to be beaten, shows that they are badly in need of encouragement.

In all the districts in which there were contests, the Government has been defeated. Sherbrooke is a County in Quebec, the electors of which are partly English-Canadians and partly French-Canadians. It is a district in which it was thought that Sir Wilfrid Laurier could successfully exert those double-dealing arts of which he is master. He played these arts with all his skill,—he was supported by about half of his colleagues in the Cabinet, while public money flowed like water. But the majority of the electors of Sherbrooke was not to be deceived or bought. Mr. McIntosh, the Liberal-Conservative candidate, has been elected.

In Winnipeg, the Government majority at the general election was 1,117; at the bye-election of yesterday an opponent of the Government was elected by a majority of 60.

In Lotbiniere, the Government's majority at the last general election was 406; at the bye-election of yesterday the Government's nominee was defeated, and an independent Liberal, who will oppose the Government, was elected, his majority being 164.

These are facts which speak louder than words.

CO-OPERATION AMONG OUR FARMERS

The largely increased attendance at our agricultural and horticultural meetings, and the deeper interest in these meetings evinced by men of the better class of farmers, evidence a desire to extend the principle of co-operation to the various branches of farm production. This movement naturally followed the success that has attended the co-operation of farmers in the dairy industry. If farmers can co-operate amicably and successfully in the production of high grades of butter and cheese, why not in high grades of sheep and lambs, pigs and poultry, eggs and apples, for all of which there a large market, cash payments and good prices? That is the question.

One of the causes of the low prices received by our farmers is the inequality of their products. One farmer takes care and produces a good thing; another farmer doesn't take care and produces a bad thing, and all go into the hands of the dealers together. Independent action results in inequality, and the result is, the article of the lower quality governs the price in the market. To overcome this drawback, it is necessary that our careful and skillful farmers should co-operate among themselves to produce considerable quantities of articles of uniformly high quality; judging by the spirit evinced at

the recent meetings that is what they are going to do.

This will not be difficult or costly. What, for instance, is to prevent the careful farmers in a settlement from co-operating in the production of poultry of the same breed, and so having eggs and fowl of the same quantity to sell,—taking for the considerable quality they produced the highest instead of the lowest price that the market will afford?

Or lambs, or hogs, or beef cattle, or apples,—why not have all these of a uniformly high quality, by means of co-operation, as well as butter and cheese?

That there are limits to which the principle of co-operation may safely be carried by farmers is admitted. Let the shoemaker stick to his last, is a wise saying of general application. Farmers cannot safely take, even by co-operation, the large risks in trade which only the skilled and practical merchant can venture. It is possible, of course, that a company of farmers might obtain the services of a manager to whom they could safely entrust the tens of thousands of dollars essential to the carrying on of a successful pork factory business and whom they could trust to oversee the work and exploit the markets of Great Britain and the neighboring Provinces. But the risk would evidently be very great and the loss, if loss were incurred, ruinous. At any rate, it will be safer and better to co-operate in respect to those things about which the farmers know.

—The Brussels correspondent of the Daily Chronicle asserts that he has learned from authentic sources that the Boers have between 85,000 and 90,000 men in the field.

—The Patriot says that the Liberal-Conservative Conference "was not very largely attended" and that "the spirit of harmony did not prevail." The Patriot lies under a mistake. It has evidently been wrongly informed.


