## Game Cancelled Last Night, Capitals Unable To Land

The first local cancellation of an Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League game occurred at the Forum last night when the Fredericton Capitals were unable to land a team. The Capitals flew to the island yesterday. On arriving here shortly after 7 p.m. they were unable to land at either local or Summerside fields due to prevailing weather conditions. The game was promptly cancelled when news of the Capitals' straits reached the Islanders Club officials. The Islanders later took to the ice and were put through a stiff two-hour workout by playing-coach Steve Brkaleich. Word received from club manager Forrest Clow, shortly after the match was called off, had it that there is a possibility that the game will be re-scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 12, at the Forum.

## Says Pentiction Vs Will Win Title Without Aid

MONTREAL (CP)—Mayor Oscar Matson of Pentiction, B.C., arrived in Montreal Monday and said his hometown Vs will win the world hockey championship and will do it without help of the National Hockey League.

Mayor Matson and his wife are en route to West Germany for the championships. They will sail from Halifax, reaching London Feb. 17 and flying from there to Dusseldorf.

"I don't see the need for all the hand-wringing whenever the subject of the Vs comes up," said the mayor. "They're fast, have won the championship in their own league with still four games to go in the regular schedule and, to put it briefly, they are the best amateur team in Canada—teaming with an amateur status, that is."

Asked about the suggestion of coach Dick Irvin on Montreal Canadiens that two players from each of the three top NHL teams—Montreal, Detroit and Toronto—be sent to play with the Vs, Mr. Matson said:

"If our boys thought they needed help, they'd grab it. But don't get me wrong. I'm convinced the offer was made graciously, and if there has been any fuss and feathers over the subject the fault doesn't lie with the Pentiction organization."

## Announce Schedule For World Hockey Ch'ship

KREFELD, Germany. (AP)—Russia and Canada will meet on the final day of the world hockey championships here March 6, just as they did in Sweden last year when the Russians defeated the Canadians to win the title.

The International Ice Hockey Federation Sunday announced the schedule for the championships to be played in four cities of West Germany from Feb. 26 through March 6.

Canada, represented by Pentiction VS, Allan Cup champions, opens against the United States at Dortmund Feb. 25. Russia and the U. S. will meet March 2.

The competition is divided into two groups. In group A Russia will defend its title against eight teams: Canada, the U. S., Czechoslovakia, Sweden, Switzerland, Poland, Finland and West Germany.

In group B play for the junior cup, defending champion Italy will compete against France, Austria, Belgium, Holland, Hungary, Yugoslavia and a West German B team.

**FOUR CITIES**

The tournament will be played in Krefeld, Cologne, Dusseldorf and Dortmund in stadiums with seating capacities ranging from 7,000 to 10,000.

Teams will get two points for a win and one for a draw. The team with the largest number of points wins the title. In case of a point tie a playoff will be held.

## Lift Suspension Of Eight Race Drivers In New York

NEW YORK (AP)—The suspension of eight prominent trotting drivers was ended Monday by George P. Monaghan, New York state harness racing commissioner, but he refused to lift a one-year ban against the president of the Standardbred Owners Association, Edward O. Dougherty of North Bergen, N.J., head of the SOA, and the drivers were suspended Nov. 10, 1954 for their part in a strike which delayed racing at Yonkers Raceway for 18 minutes on the night of Oct. 30. They sought increased purses.

Monaghan said the suspension of Dougherty "is continued in full force and effect until Nov. 11, 1955" and bars him from tracks in the United States and Canada.

He had ordered six months suspensions for the eight drivers, Hugh Bell, Cecil Champion, Stanley Dancer, Earl Hodgins, Maurice Pusey, Frank Safford, Wendell Wathen, Jr., and John Workman. Their suspension was to have extended until May 10. Trotting resumes in New York at Roosevelt Raceway April 1.

The commissioner's decision Monday followed lengthy hearings and Monaghan said the testimony established "that the drivers were misled by Dougherty's advice and guidance in connection with their right to strike or to join in the stoppage of racing."

## Pentiction To Play In Warmups

LONDON (CP)—Pentiction Vs, Canada's representatives at the world hockey championships in Western Germany, will play four warmup games in Berlin and Prague, Czechoslovakia, it was announced Monday.

J. F. (Bunny) Ahearne, vice-president of the International Ice Hockey Federation, said the British Columbia team will play in Berlin Feb. 15 and either the 17th or 18th. It will be in Prague for games Feb. 20 and 22.

The championships start Feb. 25 at Krefeld, Cologne, Dortmund and Dusseldorf with a record 16 countries contesting the two-section tournament. It concludes March 6 with Russia, defending champion, meeting Pentiction, hot favorite to regain the top spot. Canada was virtually made her own in the past.

Ahearne said the Russians apparently are planning just one warmup game, to be played in Bavaria on the way to the tournament.

MONTREAL (CP)—Kelly Burnett of Montreal Royals picked up only one assist in two games last week but it was enough to keep him on top of the Quebec Hockey League scorers.

Burnett now has 21 goals and 39 assists for 60 points, three more than Ray Powell of Quebec Aces who failed to get a point. Lulu Denis of Montreal gathered in one goal and two assists to take over third place in the official standing from teammate Orval Tessier who drew a blank.

Denis has 18 goals and 38 assists for 56 points, only one behind Powell who has scored 20 goals and counted 23 assists. Tessier has 30 goals and 23 assists.

Fern Perreault of Shawinigan Falls was the most prolific point-getter with one goal and three assists and moved from 13th to eighth place in the standing.

## Champions Stray Over The Limit

NEW YORK (AP)—Two world boxing champions, lightweight Jimmy Carter and welterweight Johnny Saxton, stray over the weight limit this week to pick up some cash in non-title bouts.

Carter's Friday bout at Boston with welterweight Tony DeMarco, a hometown favorite, could well be the bout of the week. It probably will sell out the Boston Garden. The champ gets a \$25,000 guarantee plus a privilege of 30 per cent of the gate.

Since Carter stopped Paddy DeMarco on relation Nov. 17 to win back his title, he has had only one bout, a 10-round decision over Bobby Woods.

DeMarco, No. 6 among the welter contenders, hasn't fought since he was stopped Pat Manzi in one round.

In travelling to Akron, Ohio, Saxton ventures into the hometown of Ronnie Delaney, a clever southpaw middleweight who has lost only once in 53 starts. The Akron bout is set for Friday, will be the second for Saxton since he upset Kid Gavilan at Philadelphia Oct. 20 to win the crown.

Although the match was set back once from Jan. 14 when Saxton was injured, it is expected to attract a big crowd.

After some fast switching, the International Boxing Club came up with a Wednesday show at Baltimore where Bob Baker, Pittsburgh heavyweight, will box Willie James of Boston.
