

# Rain Mars Races At Driving Park

Rain cut short Saturday night's harness racing program at Charlottetown Driving Park. It sprinkled from early evening but it came down in earnest during the sixth dash, after which officials were forced to call a halt.

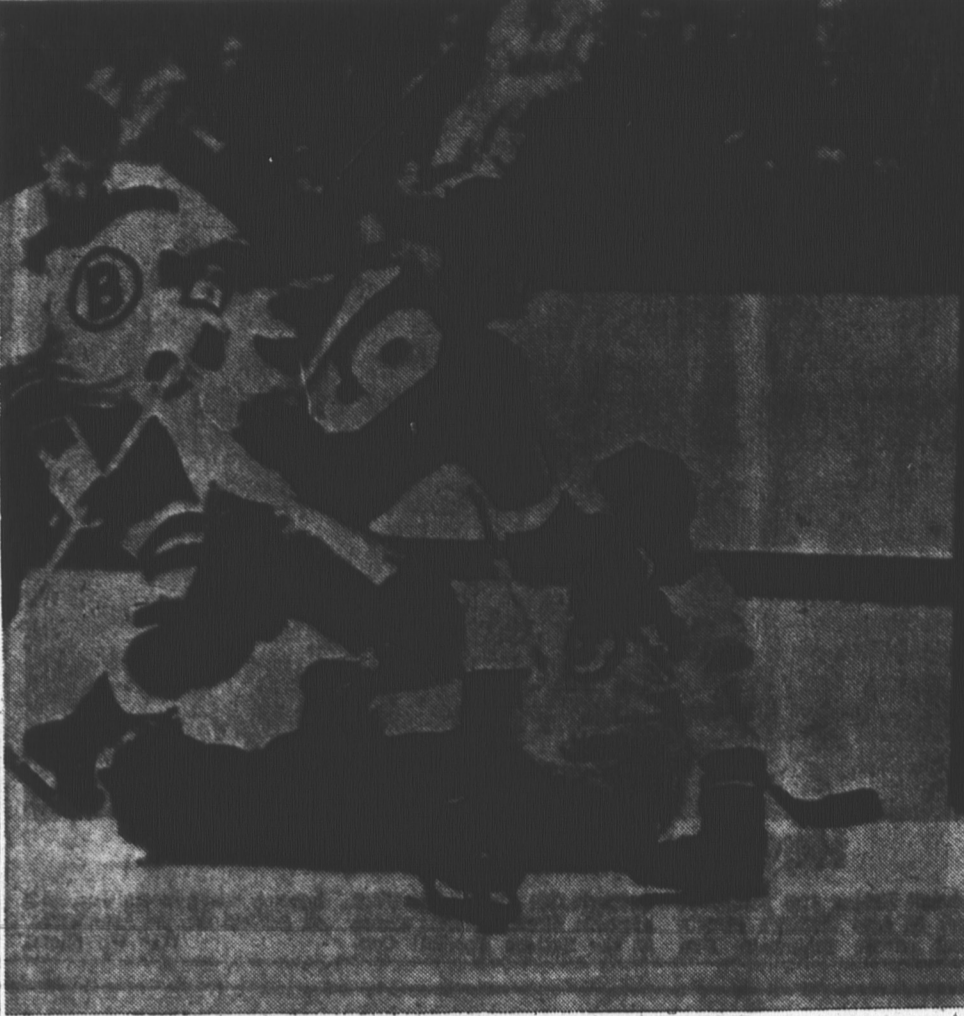

# Detroit Red Wings Crush Boston Eight To One

DETROIT (CP) — Triggered by two-goal performances from Bob Wall and Ted Hampson, Detroit Red Wings crushed Boston Bruins 8-1 Sunday night in a National Hockey League game. It was the second straight victory for Detroit, which lost its first four starts in the current campaign. And it followed the same victory pattern—the Wings started slowly and gained momentum as play progressed. Detroit outshot Bruins 45-35 in the game with 21 of the shots coming in the closing period when the Wings rattled in four goals to turn the game into a rout.

Murray Hall, Andy Bathgate, Dean Prentice and Gordie Howe, now in his 31st NHL season, added the other Detroit goals. It was the first goal of the year for Howe, all-time NHL scoring leader.

**MOVE INTO THIRD**  
Pit Martin opened the scoring for Boston in the first period and the Wings tied it before the period ended. Detroit, now tied for third place in the league standings with Toronto Maple Leafs, put the game beyond Boston's reach with three goals in the middle period.

The victory also allowed the Wings to average a 6-2 defeat at the hands of the Bruins in a season-opener at Boston.

Goalie Ed Johnston had little success as the Boston defence wilted for the first time in this season. The rebuilding Bruins are stocked with many rookies. The goal by Hampson, called up because of injuries to the Wings, was his first in the NHL since the 1962-63 season when he played with New York Rangers.
