nauts, the dogs Breezy and Coal Lump, were vacating it after a record trip.

The events erased any lingering doubt that the race is a reality, with the sweepstakes high. The pace has been terrific on both sides.

Russia initially held the lead and time after time was able to upstage U.S. efforts for the simple reason that it had a larger booster rocket that could put up more weight.

The most embarrassing moment for the U.S. occurred March 18 last year when Soviet cosmonaut Alexei Leonov became the first man to stroll in space—just five days before the U.S. was to start its two-man Gemini program with a modest five-hour flight.

Since then, however, Soviet man-in-space rockets have been quiet while six two-man Gemini teams have rocketed into orbit. The Americans have wrested virtually every manned space record from the Russians and have demonstrated the ability to manoeuvre spaceships, to work outside a spaceship and to rendezvous with other vehicles.

The Russians have not manoeuvred, rendezvoused or docked—all of which must be perfected before man ventures to the moon.

Just two weeks ago, the U.S. lofted its first unmanned Apollo moonship into space and recovered it unharmed. One more successful unmanned shot this summer could lead to an earth orbit flight by a three-man Apollo moonship into space and recovered it unharmed.

The man-in-space Saturn V rocket which is to be the moon booster is scheduled for its first test launching next January. A successful test program could lead to the first American manned lunar landing flight by 1968.

But Coal Lump and Breezy are concrete evidence that Russia is very much in the race. The dogs spent 22 days in space, whirling in and out of the potentially deadly Van Allen radiation belt. The news agency Tass reported they were in good condition when they came back to earth Wednesday.

The Van Allen belts pose no threat to men making direct approaches to the moon—because they will zip through in a matter of minutes.

Recent rumors in Moscow indicate the Russians are ready to launch their version of their moon ship. The 97,000-pound Proton 1 and 2 satellites launched last year apparently were unmanned forerunners.

A recent Czechoslovakian technical journal outlined this man-in-space Soviet plan, which many American experts feel is realistic:

1966—Launch of a six-man spacecraft for several days, with many of the pilots taking space walks.

1967—Launch of two six-man satellites to practise rendezvous and docking.

1968—Further perfection of rendezvous and docking and 30-day flights.

1969—Launch of a crew into orbit around the moon, to be followed soon afterwards by a lunar landing.

A Pakistani government member said Tuesday it was found after the 1965 war with India that 275 villages had been destroyed, wells filled in and slain. MUNSINGER MAKES MONEY

MUNICH, West Germany (CP-AP)—Gerda Munsinger, central figure in Canada's sex-and-security case, was working irregularly as a buffet manager in a local discotheque last week at 30 marks (\$8) a night.

Now her bankroll is estimated at close to \$50,000 as a result of the sudden clamor for interviews, pictures and her life story.

Joseph Ferenczy, Hungarian-born head of Ferenczy Presse Agentur, a literary agency, has not disclosed what he paid Mrs. Munsinger, 36, for exclusive rights to her story. But Munich press sources estimate she will receive between 150,000 and 180,000 marks (\$40,500 and \$48,600) from him. The West German mark is worth slightly less than 27 Canadian cents.

Ferenczy sold a television interview to the CBC for \$5,000. He also was reported to have sold a West German illustrated magazine her life story, in serial form, for 100,000 marks (\$27,000). In addition the agency has sold or is selling a movie and TV rights and story extracts, press sources said.

It was not known what money Mrs. Munsinger may have received from the Toronto Star, which first tracked her down. Her lawyer, Kenneth A. Kutzer, said Sunday that her agreement with the Toronto newspaper was a bad one and would be terminated as soon as possible.

CARACAS (AP)—President Raul Leon's cabinet resigned Tuesday to facilitate the president's reorganization of his Venezuelan government on the heels of a three-party coalition breakup.

The coalition, formed by Leon's Democratic Action party, the Democratic Republican Union and the National Democratic Front, broke up when the latter two charged they were not getting a big enough share in the government.

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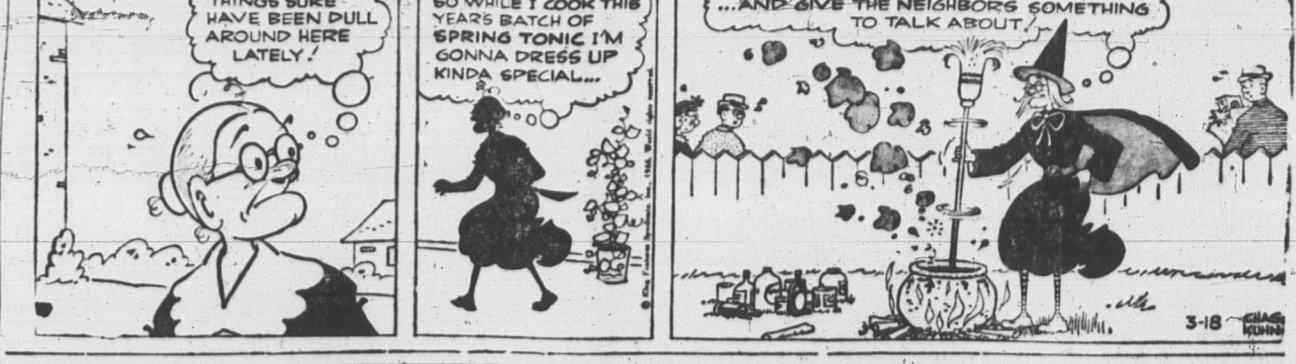

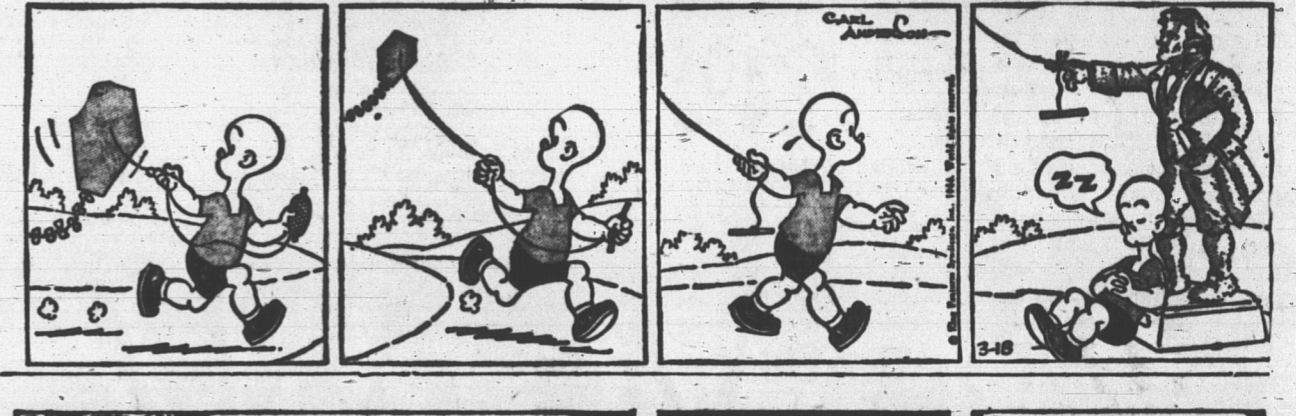

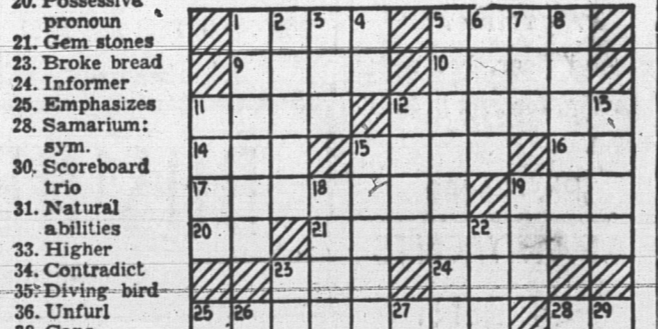

CONTRACT BRIDGE

TEST YOUR PLAY

1. You are declarer with the West hand at Six Notrump and North leads the ten of spades. How would you play the hand?

2. You are declarer with the West hand at the Jack of Diamonds, which wins, and continues with a diamond. South cashes the A-K. South returns a low heart, which you win with the ace. How would you play the hand?

3. Which opponent has the four clubs would make no difference. If it turns out that the diamond finesse at trick two loses, you will have to assume that South was dealt the K-x of clubs and rely on a finesse to bring home five club tricks.

4. There are two things to watch out for—a possible trump loser and a possible club loser. Play the ace of spades and then a low spade to the queen. If both opponents follow suit, discontinue drawing trumps.

Now lead the A-K of clubs. If the clubs turn out to be divided 3-3, draw the outstanding trump and claim the rest. If the clubs are divided, 4-2, you may or may not make the contract, depending on how the adverse cards are divided.

If the defender with the three trumps has four clubs also, you make the hand because your fourth club can be ruffed in dummy. If the defender with three trumps has only two clubs you go down one, but then you would have gone down one even if you had drawn his last trump earlier.
