Unions Agree On No-raiding Pact

TORONTO, (CP)—A non-aggression agreement between Canada's two largest union bodies became assured Thursday when it was approved by the Canadian Congress of Labor.

First of its magnitude in Canada, the historic no-raiding pact already has been endorsed by the Trades and Labor Congress and now needs only the signatures of C.C.L. officers to make its effect felt on the 980,000 membership of the two congresses.
