Woman Recalls Avalanche In Which Two Sons Died

The snow still has not been in the high reaches Nor has the grief lifted from the woman who survived. But the spring is bringing a return to life in the couple whose home was to be shattered when the avalanche struck. Here is a first-hand story as reported on the Denver Post.

As Told to HELEN FRENCH LEADVILLE, Colo. (AP) — My name is Barbara Adamich. Up to the morning of Jan. 21, 1962, I was like most other women. Tragedy to me was something you read in the paper, something I never thought of as a possibility for myself or my husband, Bill, or our two sons, Mike and Bill Jr.

But that Sunday morning I awakened to find myself a

sort of filling in an immense sandwich of splintered wood and snow. A giant snowslide had crashed down Mount Elbert, smashing our home at Twin Lakes.

A little thing kept me alive. Some time during the night I had walked onto the porch of our home to see how much snow had fallen and had slipped into a heavy sweat shirt which I was too sleepy to remove when I went back to bed. The shirt kept me from freezing in the hours from 8 to 11 a.m. — When they uncovered my face, I said "Thank you for coming." Some thought it an odd remark, but was probably the most sincere one of my life.

They found my husband, Bill, at almost the same time. But he had no way of knowing that he and I were the only survivors.

We had our two sons. Billy was 8, Mike was 7.

Diefenbaker Corrects Reference to Pearson

ST. HYACINTHE, Que. (CP) — Prime Minister Diefenbaker said here it was a "very improper interpretation" for a lay man to say he had accused Liberal Leader Pearson of being soft on communism.

He said at a press conference about his election campaign last night he had stated in a speech at Nepean, Man., last Thursday that neither Mr. Pearson nor Paul Martin, former federal minister and deputy Canadian delegation head at the United Nations, had done or said anything respecting the serious situation of Russian colonialism and Soviet tyranny over captive peoples.

Asked why he thought Mr. Pearson and Mr. Martin had not taken action to comment on a report that Mr. Diefenbaker had said he and Mr. Martin were soft on communism.

Mr. Pearson said he had not seen the report but that if it was accurate he regretted Mr. Diefenbaker "even in the heat of the election campaign would do as demands himself" to make that charge.

Mr. Pearson said he had fought communism all his adult life and twice had been voted by the Communists when he was nominated for the post of secretary-general of the UN.

Mr. Diefenbaker repeated Monday his government intends to move to the UN a resolution on the subject of Russian colonialism, "one of transcendent importance to the free world."

Asked why he thought Mr. Pearson and Mr. Martin had not taken action to comment on a report that Mr. Diefenbaker had said he and Mr. Martin were soft on communism.

INJURY CLAIMED DIPLOMATIC

LONDON (Reuters) — Britain's League Against Cruel Sports has claimed that a Prince Philip developed a "diplomatic" sore finger in Nepal last year because of the league's criticism of royal tiger shoots.

It said the effect of its protests was the alleged Whitlow (infected finger), the timely intervention which served to prevent more royal bloodshed.

The league report declared: "The league executive will continue to give attention to the triger-happy exploits of the Queen's husband, when necessary."
