Election Declared Void
In St. John's West

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Two Justices of the Supreme Court of Newfoundland Thursday declared void the Oct. 18 federal election in St. John's West, ensuring a future by-election in the riding.

Chief Justice R. S. Furlong and Mr. Justice H. A. Warner reached the same conclusion in separate judgments on a petition filed by former solicitor general William J. Browne, who lost the election by 24 votes to Liberal Richard J. Cahin.

Mr. Browne asked that the election be voided because of irregularities in the service vote.

The court has 12 days in which to send a report to the Speaker of the House of Commons, who will table it in the House. It will then be up to Prime Minister Diefenbaker to call a by-election.

Commenting on the judgment, Mr. Browne said he was "greatly pleased to know my position has been vindicated." He predicted victory in the by-election.

Mr. Browne won the election Oct. 18 by a narrow margin. He carried the service vote three to one, giving him enough votes to win.

Mr. Browne failed to request the outcome.

Macmillan called on the West to stand firm behind the U.S. while leaving every way open for a Russian retreat. He told the Commons the situation must be resolved "without a form of appeasement which will lead us into greater danger. He urged the fullest use of the United Nations to solve the crisis.

Macmillan said the Russian action in sending offensive arms to Cuba left Kennedy no choice but to act as he did.
