

## Present Gold Headed Stick To Wiltshire Dairying Pres.

At the annual meeting held on Monday, February 9th, Edwin Edwards, President of the Wiltshire Dairying Company Ltd. since 1916 was presented with a gold headed cane in honor of his services to the company over the years. Lawrence Murray read a very fitting address and George Kitson made the presentation.

Previous to the presentation to Mr. Edwards the business of the annual meeting was held. The Company again showed another record year, having manufactured 575,506 lbs. butter, about 45,000 lbs. over 1957; also having paid to patrons for cream \$327,519.70, and still realizing a profit after income taxes of \$4,447.86.
