Court Session At Georgetown

Magistrates court was held at Georgetown on Wednesday, July 24th, with Kings county stipendiary magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet presiding. A charge of breaking and entering an indictable offence against a former resident of Souris who recently has been residing in Summerside was dismissed. The case was tried by way of a preliminary hearing and resulted when a number of articles were found missing from the residence of John MacIsaac, of Saint Charles on June 18th.

A resident of Charlottetown, and one of Iona and one of Murray River were each fined \$20.00 for having liquor in their possession in a place other than their residence.

A resident of De Gros Marsh and one of Murray River were each fined \$20.00, for being intoxicated in a public place.

A Caledonia resident was fined \$5.00 for driving while not being the holder of an operator's license.

A resident of Highbank was fined \$25.00 for having liquor in his possession which had not been purchased at a vendors.

A resident of Murray River was charged with a violation of the control of a motor vehicle while intoxicated and had his case adjourned for one week with no plea being taken.

Ian M. MacLeod, crown prosecutor for Kings represented the crown in all cases.

Police Court At Souris

In Magistrates Court in Souris, charged with willful damage to property had his case dismissed. A resident of Kingsboro on a second offence of driving while his license was suspended was fined \$50. and costs of 30 days.

A resident of Souris and one from Red Point charged with being intoxicated in a public place was fined \$20. and costs of 30 days. A resident of East Baltic charged under the criminal code of creating a disturbance while intoxicated in a public place was fined \$25. and costs of 30 days. A resident of Souris River for driving while impaired was fined \$75 and costs of 30 days. His license was automatically suspended for three months.

A resident of Greenwich for causing a disturbance in a public place was fined \$20 and costs of 30 days and was bound over to the peace for one year. A brother also from Greenwich was fined \$20. and costs of 30 days and was ordered to keep the peace for one year. Another resident of Greenwich was given a two year suspended sentence and ordered to post a bond of \$500.

All three were charged for creating a disturbance in a public place. A resident of Annandale for possession of short tobacco was fined \$75 and costs of 30 days.

In last week's report of Magistrate's Court in Souris it was stated that three men from Greenwich charged with creating a disturbance in a public place were convicted. This should have read one was convicted and the other two dismissed.

Those who are tested on Thursday should return on Monday to have the tests read and X-ray if necessary. Those who are tested on Friday should return on Monday.

Remember, a positive reaction does NOT mean that you have tuberculosis, only that the person has been in contact with the disease at some time during his or her life.
