

# Turn 2,000 Acres Of Muck Into Big Vegetable Plant

**SHERRINGTON, Que. (CP)** — Some 2,000 acres of muck land in this area 35 miles south of Montreal is being developed by a comparatively new Canadian company into one of Canada's biggest vegetable factories.

The project—a vegetable growing and processing operation designed to make life easier for the housewife and give greater efficiency to food retailing—is the brainchild of Bram Dees, a native of Holland.

Mr. Dees, who has been associated with the distribution and marketing of food products since coming to Canada more than 25 years ago, launched the project called Hardee Farms Limited two years ago.

The first section of the processing plant which washes, sorts and packages vegetables can handle 125,000 packages of fresh vegetables daily for distribution to retailers.

To supply part of the vegetables required the company purchased 2,000 acres of muck land in this area and in three years expects the land to produce 100,000,000 pounds of vegetables annually.

**ALL MECHANIZED**

Practically every phase of operation will be mechanized.

Mr. Dees, who now makes his home in Toronto, says the company has acquired the latest and most modern equipment for grading, cleaning, washing, brushing and polishing produce and for treating some produce for extended shelf-life. The merchandise is placed in transparent bags by assembly line methods.

The company proposes to use Quebec-grown products whenever possible, either grown on its own plantation or acquired from other growers.

It is estimated that Quebec imports from other provinces and from the United States about \$100,000,000 worth of food products annually. One of the company's objectives, says Mr. Dees, is to promote home production, processing and packaging in Quebec.

A rear view of the Summerside Y Center shows the results of a forty-foot extension, almost completed, which provides the Y's Men with a building 60 by 31 feet. The main floor contains an office, kitchen and an auditorium measuring 66 by 31 feet. The main floor provides accommodation for the Y's Men's Club, the Y's Menettes Club, three H Y Clubs and a Phlat Club, while the full cement basement will be used in continuing the work of Boy Scouts, Wolf Cubs and Brownie groups in Y's Men's Club.
