DOMINION PARLIAMENT

The Cochrane Matter.

Unfavorable to Canada.

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.

The time of the House of Commons yesterday was taken up with the Controverted Elections Act and minor matters.

The committee on the Cochrane case presented majority and minority reports, the former acquitting and the latter condemning Cochrane.

In the Senate, Abbott gave notice of a joint address of both Houses to the Queen, asking the Imperial authorities to denounce the existing treaties between Great Britain and German Zollverein and Belgium, which contain a most favored nation clause which prevents Canada imposing higher import duties on goods from these countries than are imposed upon such goods by Great Britain.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS ENQUIRY

CROSBY ON THE STAND.

Another Cold Day for the Grits.

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.

Before the Public Accounts Committee yesterday Crosby, manager of the Dominion Type Foundry, was examined. He testified that type was supplied the Government at current rates, and his Company received no favors. He produced all the correspondence between the Company and Chapleau, which was very disappointing to the Grits. He could not explain why the Company had given the fifteen hundred dollars cheque to Benoit, President of the Conservative Association. He did not know the reason for it or what use it was put to—that transaction was with the president of the company, Murray, a strong grit, and since dead. The payment of the cheque had nothing to do with the sale of type. He managed all sales himself.

Yesterday was another cold day for the grits in committee, who are beginning to get disheartened. They tried to introduce foreign matter into the enquiry, but were promptly brought to time by Foster.

THE TARTE-McGREGGEEVY CASE

Majority and Minority Reports

A SYNOPSIS OF EACH.

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.

The report prepared by Sir John Thompson, Girouard and Adams condemns Thomas McGreevy out and out. They reject Owen Murphy's and Robert McGreevy's evidence as unworthy of belief; they find the charges against Langevin not sustained, and no evidence to show him guilty of any improper conduct; they find Larkin, Connolly & Co. guilty of conspiracy to defraud the Government in which they were assisted by Thos. McGreevy; they recommend that the conspirators be prosecuted, and that for this purpose the books and papers of Larkin, Connolly and the McGreevys, which were produced before the Committee, be retained and made available for prosecution.

Mills and Davies' report condemns Langevin unreservedly.

Both reports will be submitted to the full committee to-day.

The Millmen's Strike.

Prospects of a Settlement.

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.

The strike continues. The number of men now out is three thousand. They are receiving sympathy from all classes of workmen. There is strong hope of bringing the strike to a satisfactory conclusion. Two companies of militia are on the ground under arms.

Home Rule for Ireland.

MONTREAL, Sept. 16.

Speaking here last night, Lord Aberdeen expressed his conviction that the cause of Home Rule would soon triumph, and that the English Liberal party would never halt in its support of the Irish cause.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.)

HALIFAX, Sept. 14.—Anchoasti—A very good catch of herring last night at South-west Point, but nothing elsewhere.

Quebec—Codfishing very good to-day at Perce, and good at St. John's River; fair at Shelldrake, Long Point and Newport Point.

New Brunswick—Mackerel fair, but no cod at Point Escaumicac.

P. E. Island—No fishing as far as reported.

Cape Breton—Good catches of hake and haddock and a few fall herring. Mackerel and cod at Port Hood. Poor catches of cod and mackerel at Ingonish. Boats that got bait caught about one quintal each. At Louisbourg mackerel cod and herring at Arichat and some mackerel

at St. Peters. The Victoria arrived at St. Peters to-day from eastern banks with only twenty quintals. Reports weather unfavorable.

Nova Scotia—Fair catches of cod at Canso and a few at Whitehead; also a fine catch of herring at the former from which bankers are getting baited without delay. Herring very plentiful at Lunenburg, Port Medway and Lockport. Hake good and cod fair at Lockport and the off shore codfishing continues good at Lunenburg.

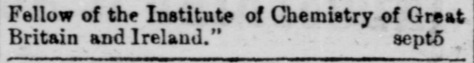
