Suggest Data Needed On Food Processing Industry

TORONTO (CP) — The Ontario government said Monday that the food processing industry should make available more financial data on its operations.

A provincial brief to the royal commission on price spreads of food products said that the "severely restricted nature" of financial data "makes it impractical to analyze the profit position of any specific segment of the food processing industry."

The commission, headed by chairman Dr. Andrew Stewart,

president of the University of Alberta, has been holding hearings across the country to determine why housewives pay so much more for their groceries than the farmer gets for the raw materials.

The Ontario brief, read by Deputy Economics Minister Gathercole, said that the limited material which can be drawn from published financial statements "does not permit an intelligent assessment of their financial operations in this province."

The problem of collecting the information, the brief said, was complicated by the fact that many firms operated on interprovincial or international basis and still others produce non-food products.

"We have made an intensive search for information on the sales, capitalization, profits and other relevant factors of Ontario food processors without obtaining any information upon which a conclusion can be founded."

The brief asked that "far more intensive and effective" efforts be made to obtain data from the processors but Mr. Gathercole was skeptical of the reaction of the processors.

Big Petroleum Cargo Arrives At Charlottetown

What is believed to be the biggest cargo of petroleum products ever brought to Charlottetown arrived aboard the Irving tanker "Irvingbrook" which tied up at the Railway Wharf Monday morning.

The 12,562-ton tanker carried a shipment of 4,810,400 gallons of oil breaking her own record of 1,322,000 gallons brought to Charlottetown in December of 1957.

The cargo will about half fill the company's block storage facilities located in the east end of the city.

Captain Otto Ottman of St. John, N.B., a company shore captain, is supervising docking and unloading operations. He commanded the "Irvingbrook" for several years before taking over his new post early this year.

Under the command of her new Captain H.P. Olthofer, who replaced Captain Karl Keller, the tanker sailed to Charlottetown directly from Curacao, an island in the Dutch West Indies.

Captain Keller now commands another company ship, the "Irving Glenn."

New Pastor Of Hunter River Charge Airs Views

The new pastor of Hunter River's United Church Charge is a man too timid to express frank views on the conditions existing between the clergy and congregations of churches in Scotland.

Rev. E. Foster Hall, due to leave Scotland shortly for his new charge at Hunter River, says the ministers are "tired of fighting Kirk sessions, women's guilds and such like" and as a result of the strained relations, "lots of ministers are leaving for places where they look at things differently."

Rev. Hall emphasized that this did not happen to be his own reason for leaving Scotland for the post on P.E.I., but added, "I have found it exasperating to see the indifference and the inability to

look at fresh ideas and new schemes."

HELP CHURCHES

Three years ago Rev. Hall launched a new scheme to help old churches through volunteer tradesmen helping on their holidays.

"Most of the volunteers were non-churchgoers," he said. "On one hand a brewer offered me a van; a church organization offered six cracked cups and saucers."

Rev. Hall, who has just resigned a charge at Musselburg, added: "I had good and sincere folk in Musselburg, but I doubt if anything worthwhile goes on. There is little co-operation between the churches and little community spirit."

Rev. Hall is due to leave for Canada next month.
