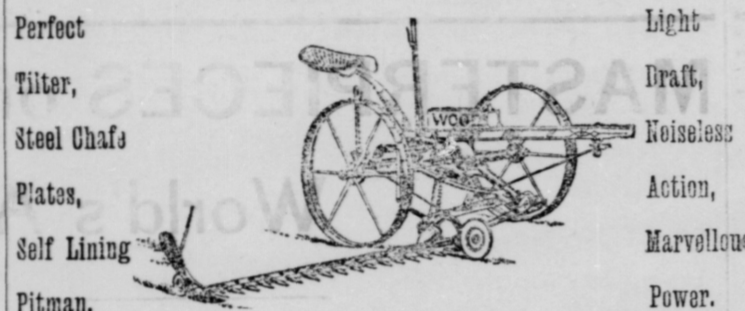

SAUCES FOR VEGETABLES.

New and Appetizing Ways of Serving Cauliflower, Carrots, Turnips, Etc.

There is a horrible monotony about the way cauliflower, asparagus, and celery are always served. An interesting and delicious sauce is poured over them and they are sent to the table with tiresome regularity. They may be varied by being covered with quite a thick white sauce, sprinkled with Parmesan cheese and colored delicate brown before the fire. Or any of them, after being cooked, may be steamed in brown gravy.

Even the despised cabbage is capable of being made appetizing. After it is boiled and pressed dry it should be chopped fine and dried again by being put on the fire in the saucepan. Add a cup of butter, season with pepper and salt and a little grated nutmeg. When hot serve on squares of hot toast.

Mashed carrots are quite as palatable as mashed turnips. They should be cooked, passed through a sieve and put into a steamer with a piece of butter, a spoonful of cream, a drop or two of tarragon vinegar, whisked up and seasoned with pepper and salt, arranged in the form of a mound and sprinkled with a little chopped parsley.

Cucumbers are seldom used except raw, and yet they are both delicious and digestible when cooked. The peel should be removed and the cucumbers should be boiled until tender, the drained and sliced, and steamed in good brown gravy, to which a very little Chili vinegar has been added, for seven or eight minutes. Radishes, like cucumbers, can be served hot as well as in salads. They should be tied in bunches and boiled for eighteen or twenty minutes, then placed on toast and covered with white sauce. Peas, French beans and sprouts are greatly improved by being tossed for a few minutes previous to sending to table in a saucepan containing a lump of fresh butter, a tablespoonful of cream, a pinch of castor sugar, and seasoning of pepper and salt.

A rather more simple way of treating French beans is to French them as they are put into a pan with a piece of butter, the juice of half a lemon and a little pepper and salt.

A ragout of peas needs but to be eaten to be appreciated. Put three ounces of butter into a saucepan with a teaspoonful of minced onion, a few leaves of fresh mint, pepper and salt. When these ingredients have simmered for a few minutes—take care that they do not acquire the least color—add a quart of green peas, and shake the pan to prevent their burning; after five minutes add half a pint of water, a very little horseradish, and a half a teaspoonful of powdered sugar. Cover the pan closely, and draw it to the side of the fire, and let the contents cook slowly for about three-quarters of an hour; if allowed to boil the water will soon be absorbed, and unless more is added at once, the peas, instead of being large and tender, will be shrivelled and hard.

How to Hang the Hammock. There is science in the hanging of a hammock both for comfort and grace. The hammock should be six and a quarter feet from the ground at the head and three and three-quarters above ground at the foot end. The rope at the head which rests on the floor, should be fastened to the foot should measure four feet. It may sound as though this made the hammock very high, but it is just right, as our feet in the hammock find out. For convenience and effect, a hassock is used on which our feet rest and swings herself in place from the foot end, in this way there is no "trucked by" dirt, and one's shoes are not more conspicuous than one's head.

The hammock paraphernalia is now as usually obtained from the throat of a girl's outfit as tennis racket or parasol, and it requires infinitely more careful thought than the other articles of the outfit. The hammocks themselves are beautiful, being woven of strands of colored silks. A brunette chooses a yellow and black with heavy fringes, while a blonde takes a soft baby blue and white one. One black-eyed belle has packed a gorgeous crimson one.

With the hammock goes the pretty varied colored silk blankets and down pillows made of white linen and embroidered with the owner's monogram. Hammocks may be made of straw, grass, or any other appropriate material. These hammocks are often seen on piazzas and across hall ways as well as on the lawn.—New York Sun.

Fraudulent Sweetbread. "A true sweetbread is perhaps the most wholesome meat that can be eaten," said a doctor yesterday, "but you are never to get it. The sweetbread proper is the pancreas, which is one of the most effective agents in promoting digestion, but the sweetbread of trade is usually obtained from the throats of cattle and is what is called the thyroid gland. This gland rests against the windpipe, and while its texture is soft like that of the real sweetbread, it has not the same beneficial qualities. But some butchers, in order to make money, use off the salivary gland, that which furnishes the saliva located in the cheeks, for a sweetbread. This is the most inferior substitute for all. The pancreas or real sweetbread is a most dainty morsel. It is of triangular form, while the sweetbreads obtained from the throats of an ox or a pig are round. They are the use of making people dissatisfied. They have been eating thyroid and salivary glands for sweetbreads for years and have been satisfied. But then they have never tasted the real thing."—Pittsburg Dispatch.

Secrets in Domestic Economy. A heated knife will cut hot bread as smoothly as cold. Do not iron black stockings, but pull them into shape and dry in the shade. To keep cheese from molding or from drying wrap it in a cloth dampened with vinegar and keep it in a covered dish. Try equal parts of ammonia and turpentine for removing paint, then washing in ends. Do not wash windows with soap. A little alcohol and water rubbed on quickly will leave the panes bright and shining if wiped dry. Oilcloth should never be scrubbed, but washed with a soft cloth in lukewarm water, to which has been added a little salt. Pumice stone is good for cleaning cracked ware. You can drive nails into hard wood without bending them if you dip them first in lard.
