PROTECTION OF TROUT STREAMS

SIR,—I was pleased a few days ago to notice a communication in your valuable paper from Dr. P. C. Murphy with respect to the protection of our trout streams.

I would like to supplement what he has already said, and give as my opinion that so long as the protection service is controlled politically very little benefit will result therefrom.

Let me give you one instance in support of my contention. Some years ago, after a long and persistent struggle on the part of some of our leading sportsmen, there was a special warden appointed to watch one of the best trout rivers on the Island, and for a time excellent work was done by him, and some assistants. But what was the outcome of this movement? One of our local politicians, finding that the enforcement of the law was alienating the affections of some of his political supporters and turning them against him, called a halt, and without much delay the protection service, which was doing so much good by the removal of numerous nets from the river and the confiscating of the same, was withdrawn. Again, the warden appointed in a great many cases as a reward for their fidelity to the cause, and it matters little whether they are within one, or three miles, of the river which they are supposed to protect, may be seen these once or twice in the fishing season, particularly if they think there may be any one around who possesses a bottle filled with something stronger than ginger beer. Until we have a Fish and Game Society composed of a large number of influential politicians which can have some "pull" on our political leaders, so long will the sportsmen whip the streams in vain. There are other matters which I should mention but this letter is now too long. Thanking you for your valuable space, I remain, yours, &c.

CONVENT OF NOTRE DAME.

Commencement Exercises Very Successful—Special Prizes.

There was a large attendance at the commencement exercises of the Convent of Notre Dame last night, and everyone was delighted with the manner in which the choice programme prepared for the occasion was presented. The decorations of the hall and stage was another feature that gave great pleasure. Colored lights and red, white and blue streamers, with choice flowers and potted plants were artistically blended, and with the multitude of white-robed children seated upon the stage made a picture that had only to be seen to be appreciated. The musical numbers on the programme were all good, the piano, mandolin and guitars blending well. The singing was also excellent. The operetta "Waited, a Parlor Maid," the leading parts in which were taken by the Misses Walsh and Miss Larkins, was cleverly acted and afforded much amusement. Another feature that pleased was the Empire Drill, the different movements in which were cleverly executed by a number of the more advanced pupils wearing red, white and blue costumes and bearing the Union Jack. 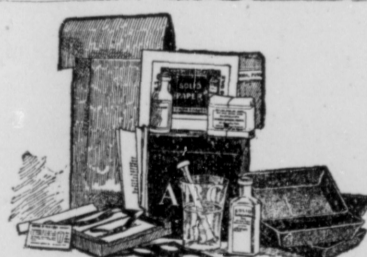
