Education Dept. Buys Two Pre-Fab Huts

Hon. Gordon Bennett, minister of education announced yesterday morning that the government has purchased two pre-fabricated huts from War Assets Corporation in Toronto, and plans to use them to provide additional classroom space to take care of a heavy overflow of students at the Vocational Institute.

Mr. Bennett said the huts are of all-new material, never used and could be acquired at a reasonable price plus the cost of transportation here. They are 20 feet wide by 80 feet long and he believes many farmers and oth-

ers could make good use of similar ones on farms or other projects including major construction jobs.

The Minister stated the huts are in the process of being assembled—they come in sections—and he hopes many Islanders will look them over to see the desirable features they offer. While the cost was not definitely stated it is believed War Assets, which has them on hand from the former camp at Debert, is disposing of them at a figure believed in the \$1,250 range plus transportation costs.

Three Youths Convicted

Three Brackley Point youths, Dennis Lee Gray, David Wallace Shaw and Nelson George Shaw were each given two-year suspended sentences and ordered to enter into a recognizance of \$500 with two sureties of \$250 each. They appeared on a charge of theft of a 12-foot fibreglass boat, total value exceeding \$50, the property of James MacKay. The penalty was passed on the boys after each pleaded guilty and elected trial by magistrate before Queen's County Court Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C., at a special sitting of the court yesterday afternoon.

Acting for the three accused was Gordon Tweedy and the Crown Attorney was John P. Nicholson, Q.C.

Mr. Nicholson said the Crown would agree to a suspended sentence in view of the fact neither of the boys had a previous record.

SDU Students Attend Sessions

ALBERTON — A group of students from St. Dunstan's University attended a weekend of interfaith discussion at the Sacred Heart Rectory in Alberton Nov. 11 to 13. Among the eighteen participants were students, nurses, sisters and Rev. James Kelly.

Rev. David MacDonald, M.P., was guest participant on Friday evening.

The main topics for discussion were selected from questions of the participants themselves at the opening meeting on Friday evening. Chief among the questions were: "What is My Responsibility as a Christian To The World?" From these questions sub-topics were chosen to be discussed throughout the day. Among these were: "Is Christ A Model To Be Imitated, or Is He More Than This?" "What Is The Place of Suffering In The Christian Life?"

Different opinions were expressed on these topics but it was generally agreed that Christianity can be meaningful and relevant only if there is a personal conviction on the part of the Christian.

Fined \$10 and costs or five days were: Claude Gaudet, Summerside, for failing to stop at a

stop sign; Walter Clark Schurman, New Annan, Cecil Cameron, Summerside, and Eimer DesRoches, Summerside, all for speeding.

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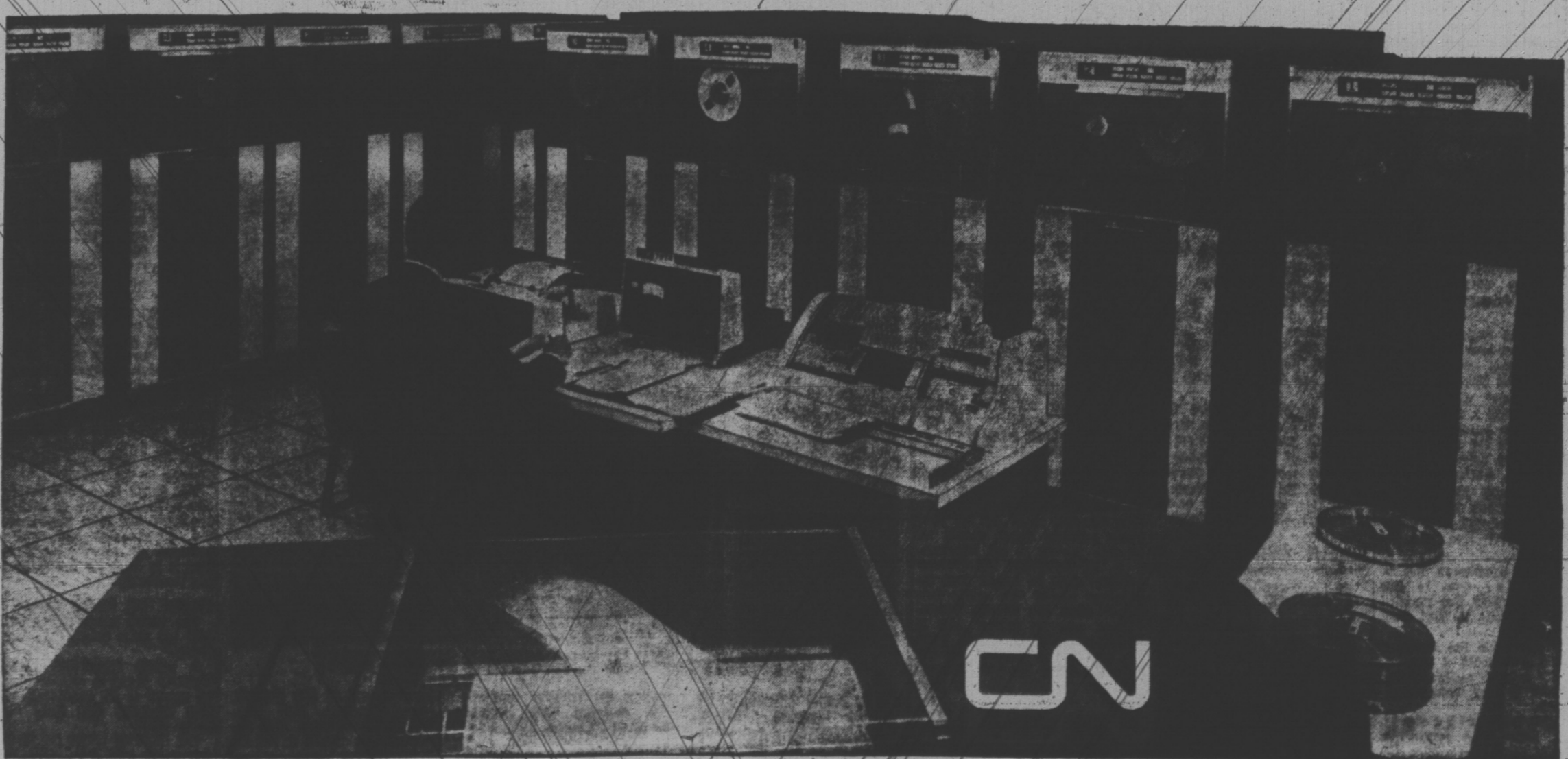
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
