On the other hand, a purely patriotic one may well be too broad and too lack the essential elements of self-interest."

"Thus, I am for a happy combination of the two. Personal initiative and incentive coupled with an appreciation of our wider responsibility as citizens can, I believe, effectively promote and carry out this drive for membership for us all," Mayor Stewart said.

Living Costs Up In Sept.

OTTAWA (CP) — Living costs rose in September to an eighth consecutive month to a new peak.

The bureau of statistics reported Monday that the consumer price index rose to a record 124.2 at Oct. 1 from 123.3 in Sept. 1. It was 119.3 a year earlier.

The index is based on 1949 prices and is the best indicator of living costs in the country. It includes the cost of food, clothing, housing, and other necessities.
