

Lund And MacLean Lead Abbies To 4-1 Victory Over Curran And Briggs

The hard hitting Intermediate Abbies moved two points farther ahead of the pack in their race to win the Island Baseball League honors yesterday afternoon as they whipped the Curran and Briggs Juniors 4-1 on Memorial Field.

A four-run seventh inning, highlighted by first baseman Eddy Lund's homer, was all the Abbies needed as Donnie MacLean won a pitching duel from young Jack Kearns of the Curranites.

The game was played under protest. Coach Johnny Carroll of the Curranites who was ejected from the contest in the third inning, protested the game on the grounds that the umpire erred on a foul ball call.

The Abbies collected only five hits of Kearns but they put four of them back to back in the seventh. The visitors likewise collected five hits of the unbeaten Donnie MacLean. The latter has won seven games this year in seven appearances.

The versatile Charlie Ryan started the Abbies game winning rally as he led off the seventh with a line drive single into deep left field. "Buck" Whitlock followed with a ground single into right field and Jack "Spv" Ready drove Ryan home with a single in center.

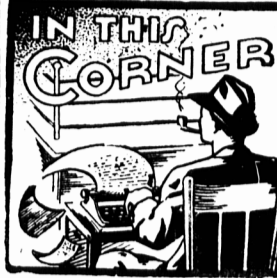
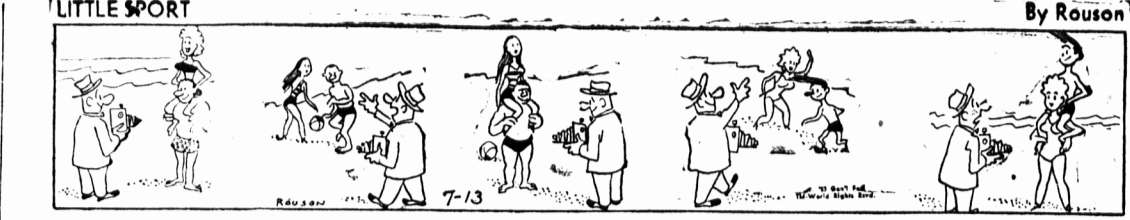
Ready caught the Curranites in field rapping and headed for second after the outfield returned the ball. Kearns attempted to throw out the Abbies leftfielder but hit the player as he raced into second. At the same time Whitlock raced home from third with the winning run.

Lund then blasted a long drive over the fence in left field to account for the Abbies extra runs.

The hard-hitting Lund also accounted for the Abbies only other hit of the game as he smashed a triple into left field in the second inning.

The visitors got their lone run in the ninth frame. With one out Neil Walker singled, LePurgey walked and Ed Dalton drove Walker home with a Texas League single. MacLean then struck out Cannon to end the game.

Babe Britton Sets New Record; O'Meara Drives Five Winners Here Sat.

Babe Britton, the free-legged pacing mare owned by George Thompson and driven by Len O'Meara established a new record Saturday night and paced the fastest mile in the Maritimes this season, as she won the second dash of the Free-for-All in 2:08 4-5 in the racing meet at the Charlottetown Driving Park.

The Babe, pacing in the greatest form of her career, swept both dashes of the big event. She was forced to the wire by Johnny Kalmuck in the first dash and by Abbeland in the second. She paced the first mile in 2:09.

The double win by the Babe highlighted the great night's driving by the capable Len O'Meara. O'Meara drove five winners in the eight dashes. He also had two thirds and a fifth.

It was a night of upset victories, thrilling races, and big pari-mutual pays. The daily double ticket on Rosalie H. and Babe Britton paid \$284.00 and the quinella on Money Royal and Arionway paid \$237.00.

The largest crowd of the season sat in on the night's racing. They saw double victories by Rosalie H., Babe Britton, Valley Long and single wins by Money Royal and Royal Scott Jr.

The favored Neil Kalmuck failed to settle into her smooth gait going away, and finished the first lap back of the field. She pulled up to fourth position around the last turn into the stretch and held it. My Darling was a close second.

Miss Playfair also sprang somewhat of a surprise, taking both dashes with very strong finishes. She was second, and hemmed in at the rail by Lena's Bob during the latter half of the second lap in the first dash, but had too much foot for the others when they wheeled out of file formation for the burst to the wire. In the second dash she was again coming into the stretch, and again stormed under the cross lights a head in front of Wayne S. Gratton.

Winnie's Last won both dashes in her class, R. C. Shea's gelding taking a new mark of 2:15 in the first event. Senator Craigmyle with two seconds looked good to capture the second heat, but broke in the stretch, and came under the wire to place.

Eva Budlong had things comparatively easy in the number one and five races, but close exciting finishes were staged between the number two and three horses in each dash. Simcoe Peter nosed out Julie Clegg in the first, and the Freeborn horse was again home in No. 2 slot in the second, Ma Cherie this time furnishing spirited competition.
