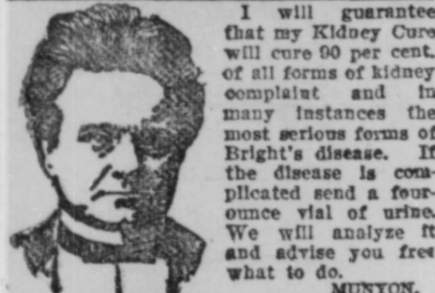

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Richmond Guardian thus calculates the taxation:

"Taking the population of 1896 at 5,390,000, the amount put into the treasury would represent \$7.14 per head, and assuming that the population today is 5,659,000 the per capita contribution is \$8.67; or taking only customs and excise, the per capita rate was \$5.42 and today it is \$6.63."

The actual increase in the rate of taxation—accepting the customs and excise alone as taxes—is \$1.21 per head, or in round figures, \$6 per family. But, as Mr. Tarte says, "wait till you see us next year."

The Peace Congress

LONDON, May 18.—The Rome correspondent of the Times says:—"Signor Crispien writes to the Nuova Antologia that the arguments of the Vatican in favor of representation at The Hague are untenable, as the Pope has neither army nor fleet. The invitation to the United States he considers important, especially as the South American Governments have not been invited. He believes that the appearance of the United States in European councils will be followed by their intervention in all European questions. The conference, he declares, will avoid but will not eliminate causes for quarrel, it will neglect but will not destroy the germs of war."

A Noble Criminal.

St. PETERSBURG, May 18.—A trial which has caused a great sensation here, owing to the high station of the prisoner, has just been concluded.

The evidence disclosed that the accused, Maria Meshwizka, a woman of noble birth, had led an extraordinary career of intrigue and crime. The court found her guilty of poisoning her lover and two women, owing to jealousy; of kidnapping a child, and of forging documents and bill of exchange.

She was sentenced to 15 years' penal servitude in Siberia, and to be deprived of her title of nobility.

A MEETING of the Provisional Directors of the P. E. Island Dairy Association was held on Tuesday, May 16th. Arthur Simpson, Bay View, was elected president; John Anderson, Kensington, vice president, and Alfred E. Dewar, Southport, secretary-treasurer. By-laws were prepared which are to be approved by the Lieut. Governor in Council before coming in force. Particulars as to admission of members will be published as soon as by-laws are approved. It was decided to engage Mr. Fraser T. Morrow as instructor from June 1st to December 31st at a salary of \$100 per month, Mr. Morrow paying his own expenses. The Federal Government has decided to give the Association a grant of \$300.00, the Provincial Government will pay at the rate of \$400.00 per year the balance required to be made up by the factories making cheese or butter for export. It was also decided to call a meeting of representatives of the factories and others interested, in Charlottetown on Tuesday, June 13th, for the purpose of arranging a Dairy License Board of Trade and making rules and regulations for the government of the same.—A. E. DEWAR, Sec'y. Treasr.

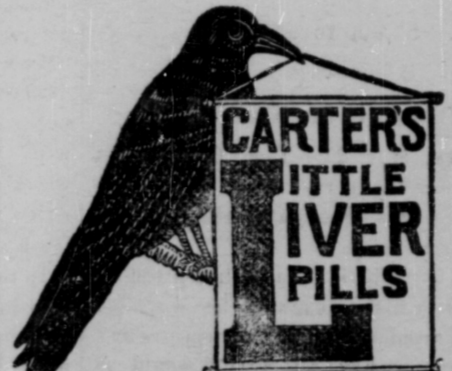
Correspondent Corrected.

LONDON, May 18.—If British opinion remains unprejudiced against Canada in the matter of the Joint High Commission it will not be the fault of the New York and Washington correspondents. Their daily theme in the English journals is Canada's obstreperousness, and her refusal to cooperate with British and American statesmen in a fair settlement.

The Times' New York correspondents varies this attitude today by quoting the New York Sun's declaration of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's fear that Sir Charles Tupper is the real cause of Canada's intractability.

Other Washington despatches welcome Sir Julian Pauncefote's return to London as an indication that the Imperial Government means to waive Canada to one side.

The Times, however, in an editorial disabuses the American mind by a reminder that the main interests involved are Canadian, and that Imperial interests are only secondary. "Give and take is," says he "the very essence of the negotiations, but it would be futile and mischievous for the Imperial Government to press upon Canada conditions which she cannot regard as at least a fair working compromise."
