## NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL

### SOME INTERESTING DEVELOPMENTS.

#### The Tariff Not Yet Ready—Government Killing Time.

OTTAWA, April 6.—An interesting return of unforeseen expenses was brought down yesterday in reply to a motion of Hon. Mr. Foster.

The sum of \$30,000 was drawn by the Ministers for the expenses of the Tariff Commission. The details as given include only \$934. No report is furnished showing the manner in which the balance was expended.

On October 17th last Hon. Mr. Laurier personally drew from the Treasury for the investigation \$3,000, and three days later another advance of \$1,000 was made to the Premier.

The sum of \$650 was paid to Captain Bloomfield Douglas, and \$350 to Captain Labelle. Mr. H. J. Palmer, of P. E. Island, had at the time the return was made drawn \$100. No information is given respecting the disposition of the remaining \$2,000.

Hon. Mr. Blair declined to give Mr. Foster any information respecting the proposed grant to the Grand Trunk Railway of a quarter of a million of dollars for improvements to Victoria Bridge, Montreal, claiming that the negotiations are not yet concluded.

Sir Charles Tupper asked if the Government could not see its way clear to postpone the franchise bill, which was not immediately necessary, and take up the tariff, which was a pressing matter.

Hon. Mr. Davies replied that the Government was getting the tariff ready as fast as the Ministry could do it. The Ministers had to consult their friends.

## GREECE AND TURKEY.

### GREAT BRITAIN WILL PARTICIPATE IN BLOCKADE OF GREEK PORTS.

#### Policy of the Powers in Respect to the Difficulty.—The Aggressor shall Suffer.

LONDON, April 7.—Cretan matters came up in the House of Commons yesterday.

Mr. Balfour said that Great Britain could not hesitate to participate in the blockade of Greece if such action should become necessary in the interests of peace.

In reply to questions, Mr. Balfour also said that the date of the withdrawal of Turkish troops from Crete had not been fixed. In the meantime the Powers were making a joint declaration to the Government at Athens and to the Government at Constantinople, as a result of which it was hoped the peace would be maintained. The declaration was that in the event of a conflict upon the Greek frontier the aggressor would be answerable for all the consequences of the disturbance of peace to which the powers attached the greatest importance, and also whatever might be the result of the struggle between Greece and Turkey, the powers would not consent that the aggressor should derive the slightest advantage therefrom.

#### A Moderate Circular.

THREE RIVERS, April 6.—The circular letter read on Sunday, in Champlain from Bishop LaFleche, was quite moderate in its tone. His Lordship said that the school settlement was unsatisfactory to the Canadian Bishops, and this question was now in the hands of the Papal delegate.

#### Champlain Election.

MONTREAL, April 6.—The impression amongst moderate people here is that the Conservative candidate will be re-elected in Champlain to-morrow notwithstanding the heavy flow of white whiskey and kindred devices.

## TROOPS FOR ENGLAND.

(The Star, April 1st.)

Captain McDougall, Adjutant of the Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery, arrived at Brigade headquarters this morning. At the instance of Major General Gascoigne he will arrange the details of the proposal to send a contingent from Canada to take part in the Jubilee celebration.

A plan has been formulated and meets with the approval of both Sir Richard Cartwright, the acting Minister of Militia, and Major General Gascoigne, and as soon as the list of officers and men has been made up, the particulars will be cabled to England to know if such a contingent will be acceptable to the home authorities.

The original intention was to take over about 700 officers and men, but it is more than probable that owing to the large number which will be present from the different Colonial possessions of the Empire it is thought that the Canadian military contingent will not be over 200 strong. These will be all picked men and will represent every corps in the Dominion.

The selection of officers has not yet been made, other than that Captain McDougall will go as Adjutant and Captain Cartwright, of Toronto, as Assistant Adjutant.

A troop ship will be provided and will leave the port of Montreal about June first and will leave England again in the neighborhood of July 1.

It is expected that the entire cost of the expedition will be about \$60,000, and of this sum \$25,000 has been arranged for. The balance of the corps and the men selected are expected to pay themselves. Each man's share toward the general fund will be about \$100.

#### Filled Cheese.

The manufacture of filled cheese was restricted to the Fox river section of Illinois, where skimmilk could be cheaply had from the creameries, and this was mixed with oleo and neutral oils in the making of the cheese. The year previous to Sept. 1, when the act of congress went into effect, 15,000,000 pounds of the cheese were made, yielding a revenue of \$1,000,000 and keeping 30 factories busy. The law requires the payment of a heavy license to engage in the manufacture and a license to sell wholesale or retail. A tax of 1 cent a pound is imposed, and all of the cheese must be so marked that the public may know what it is. The law was expected to be prohibitory, but a foreign market had been created for the cheese, and since September three factories have qualified to Collector Mize, the last one a week ago. Stamps have been issued for 55,000 pounds of the cheese. The manufacturers expect during the coming year to make about 1,500,000 pounds, mostly for the foreign trade.—Chicago Times-Herald.
