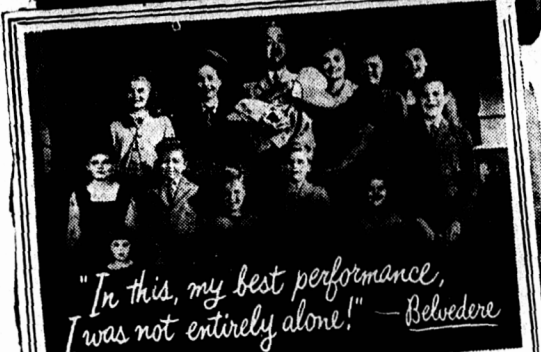

in conduct. Possibly he was what we call an "unconscious Christian."

He needed the optimism of Wordsworth. The latter speaks of "greetings where no kindness is," but neither this fact nor anything else shall prevail against that all that we behold is full of blessings. He too, "heard the still sad music of humanity," not harsh nor grating, though of ample power to chasten and subdue." But on the other hand, "there was a presence that disturbed him with the joy of elevated thoughts."

G. W. E. Russell, in his life of our poet says this at the end: "There never lived a human being to whom literature and society - books and people - taking each word in its most comprehensive sense, yielded a livelier or more constant joy." "Never" said Mr. Morely, "shall we know again so blithe and friendly a spirit."
