C. A. C. C.—Members are requested to be ready to go on the weekly run after the first of the road race this evening. The start will be made from the Malpique Road. The captain will whistle the call.

Lightning Storm.—The lightning struck a tree yesterday on North Street, near North street. It ran down the tree, tore up the sidewalk and scattered the ground in all directions.—Halifax Herald.

Police Court.—This forenoon C. Fred Russell, the stranger arrested for vagrancy last week, was discharged on condition that he leave the city within twenty-four hours. Philip Murray, for drunkenness, was fined \$2 or 10 days.

Revenue Losses.—Mr. L. P. Tanton has sent as a very fine sample of the fruit of elegant longipes, a new fruit that has been introduced of late years. The specimen sent is well grown, and is the first we have heard of as being raised in this Province.

The Engineers.—In the senior spoon competition on Saturday afternoon, Corporal Baird won the spoon, with 54 points. Major Weeks was second with 62 points. In the junior competition, Corporal Wake and Corporal Hooper were victors. They will show off at a future date. Corporal Wake's time was 44 minutes and 50 seconds. Corporal Hooper's time was 45 minutes and 10 seconds.

The Oar.—The four oar race at Halifax on Saturday evening was won by the Canadian crew, with the English crew second, Halifax third and St. John fourth. The time of the race was 18.31. The race was for the championship of the world and a first prize of \$1,000, a second prize of \$250 and a third of \$100.

Sad Drowning Accident.—A sad drowning accident occurred in Pictou harbor on Friday afternoon at 4.30. John E. Owen, painter, with his three sons, were crossing from Pictou to Abercrombie Point. A heavy squall struck the boat and capsized her, throwing the occupants ashore. A boat at once set out from the shore, but was unable to save the boys. The two eldest evidently died in the attempt to save the youngest boy. This body of Alexander, the eldest, was recovered at 4 o'clock. The boys were 9, 11 and 21.

SPAIN'S TROUBLES. The troubles of Spain are multiplying. A despatch says that private advices have been received in Lisbon from Madrid that the existence of a secret Cuban committee has been discovered there and that certain Cuban exiles who were in Madrid have vanished. It has also been discovered, the advices say, that separatist schemes relative to the Philippine Islands are on foot. As a result of certain acts of subordination amongst the last 6,000 men sent back for Cuba and the discovery that secret proclamations were being calculated among the soldiers, and in view of the notorious relations of the troops to go to Cuba, the reinforcements, 4,000 strong, who will be embarked at the end of August will be forwarded without arms, through fear of mutiny among them, and their arms will be forwarded by other vessels. The advices also state that desertions from the army are numerous, especially in Aragon. Far is entertained by the authorities that disorders will occur during the dispatch of reinforcements to the Spanish forces in Cuba, and elaborate precautions are being taken to prevent trouble. Instructions have been given to the Spanish Censor to suppress all telegrams relating to the matter. The New York Journal also says that a revolutionary address to the residents of Porto Rico was read in the towns of that island on the 29th. Advices from the island state that the people are preparing for an uprising against Spain's oppression, and will join hands with Cuba in battling for liberty. The address to the Porto Ricans was issued by Dr. J. Julius Hernandez, of New York City, the president of the Revolutionary Committee of Porto Rico in the United States.

BACK FROM HALIFAX.

Unsworth and Cook Tendered a Reception on Saturday.

Saturday evening was a gala one among wheelmen. Their reception of Unsworth and Cook on their arrival from Halifax was an enthusiastic one as it was impromptu. Long before the arrival of the Pictou boat thousands of friends, admirers and lovers of the bicycle crowded the wharf. As the steamer neared the landing the Citizens' Band, who had kindly volunteered their services, struck up "Auld Lang Syne." Seemingly, the two victors tried to evade their enthusiastic friends by attempting an escape by the lower deck, but no sooner had they set foot on the wharf than they were hoisted on the shoulders of stalwart cyclists and borne amidst cheers to a barouche prepared for their reception. The procession then moved in the following order: Citizens' Band leading, followed by the members of the C. W. A. and C. A. C. C. on their wheels, the carriage with the victors, followed by a vast number of people in carriages and on foot. The march was up Great George to Richmond Street, along to Queen, up Queen to Keat, along Keat to Cook's house, where the wheelmen lined on each side of the street and gave three cheers as the carriage passed. After leaving Cook at his home the procession reformed and proceeded to Unsworth's home, and again the cyclists lined out and cheered long and loud as the two-mile champion passed. Throughout the march the music played with great spirit, and at times the wheelmen chimed in with their bells to the music. The numbers that attended this reception shows the interest taken by the citizens in sports, and this ought to encourage our young men to turn to sports, not only in wheeling, but in other athletic exercises.

The wedding was announced in the local papers to take place at the residence of Rev. G. B. Curry pastor of Sacred Heart Church, that night. At the appointed time the couple went to the residence, but Father Curry had several visitors and they did not remain. On Thursday morning they went back and the ceremony was performed amidst a great deal of chaffing, the contracting parties still believing it to be a joke. The bride and groom went about their ordinary duties, and were no more to each other than friends. Last night Mr. Howard desired to call upon a friend, and announced his intention at the Commercial Hotel, where he boarded. Father Curry, who was at the table, accidentally heard it, and informed the young man that he was legally married. He went to the home of the bride, and the two are now living together.

A CONVICTS CONSPIRACY.

HANNAH, July 31.—Details received here from the Isle of Pines, the penal settlement on that coast, show that the conspiracy to murder the Governor, Col. Berziz and capture the guardship and raise the soldiers of thearrison were at mass, and it is possible the plan might have succeeded had it not been for the fact that a woman gave the alarm in time for the troops to be called to arms, and the supposed conspirators were suppressed. It is rumored that 300 people on the Isle of Pines have risen in rebellion and are taking steps to attack the town where the city council, presided over by the governor, Col. Jose Berziz, is taking steps to fortify the place, with the assistance of the troops and townspeople. The prisoners captured are believed to have been summarily executed.

A TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

The Quebec Chronicle reports a dreadful accident at Ste. Philomena, County of Lo-Binie, Monday the wife of Mr. P. L. Lavoie was working in the hay field with her husband. She was on the top of a load of hay. In attempting to slide off from it she was caught on the point of a 25th wheel which her husband was striking by the afflicting sight that he lost his presence of mind and was unable to render at first a valuable assistance. She was taken home in a very unconscious condition. The physician who attended her would have no hope of saving her life.
