Mr. Fix-It Surrenders

TORONTO, Aug. 30 — (CP) — Harry (Swaby) Swartz of Toronto, named today by the Ontario Racing Commission, as the "Mr. Fix-It" behind race fixing at Fort Erie, surrendered to police late today to face charges of defrauding the public.

The commission said that Swartz was one of the two men behind a series of fixed horse races, now being investigated by the racing board. The second man was not named.

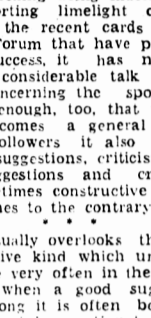
