Preparing For Railway Emergency In Maritimes

MONCTON Dec 31 — The Canadian National Railways is marshalling equipment and in the event of cessation of CPR services as announced by the company, will be running special trains out of Saint John to handle the thousands of immigrants expected to land at that port, according to George Stiven, General passenger agent of the CNR's Atlantic Region.

Plans are already made to handle the transportation of Hungarian refugees due to arrive at Saint John by the Italian liner "Castel Bianco." Originally due Monday. The ship has been delayed by Atlantic gales and will now arrive Wednesday. Special cars on a regular CNR train out of Saint John will bring 150 of these refugees to Moncton, and other trains will transport the remainder to Montreal, Toronto and points west.
