DEBT AND LIABILITIES.

ELECTORS in Belfast and Murray Harbor cannot fail to remember that the Liberals when out of office raised a hue and cry about the increase of the public debt. The interest on the debt in the year 1890 was \$2797.44. This burden was represented as "enormous." It would never do to allow it to increase. "Ends must be made to meet." The Liberals were, upon this understanding, given a majority and control of public affairs. Hope was held out that "ends would be made to meet" without taxation; but if not, then taxes would be applied after the people had been consulted. This was the distinct declaration of the Liberal Leader of that day.

Now, let us see what has happened. Taxes were imposed immediately after the elections of 1891,—and the people were not consulted.

Though \$40,000 to \$50,000 in taxes have since been annually taken out of the people's pockets, ends have not been made to meet in any one year. On the contrary, there have been a series of deficits until at the end of 1898—the Provincial Auditor reported—

Cash balance against the Province.....	\$117,146 71

The interest on the public debt paid last year amounted to \$18,558.90 or about nine times more than in 1890! To sum up, we pay as a result of what has happened since the Liberals came in, \$45,000 a year in taxes and \$18,500 a year interest; and the permanent burdens of the Province are increased by \$61,000 a year.

In addition to all this, a liability of \$12,000 a year, for all time to come has been incurred on account of the proposed Hillsborough bridge. This liability is justifiable, though an effort ought certainly to have been made to get it out of the sum which Canada owes this Province. Taking this into account, the public debt and liabilities of the Province have been swelled to upwards of a million of dollars by a party that obtained office upon a distinct pledge to make ends meet.

This party is now about to apply, in the persons of Attorney General McKinnon and its candidate in the Belfast district, for an expression of the electors' confidence in its good faith and ability. What will the answer be?

—If anyone wants to know the true character of the Farquharson Administration, and how much it is entitled to the confidence of the people, let him apply to Captain William Welsh, ex-M. P., etc., one of the old Liberals!

Ottawa Journal: Sir Wilfrid Laurier is reported as saying at St. Croix Tuesday that his government had lessened taxes. The official returns of the finance department, however, have the audacity to say that the customs and excise taxes were last fiscal year about six million dollars more than the year before, and ten millions more than the average under Conservative rule.

PROMISE AND PERFORMANCE.

We shall make ends meet, said the Liberals when they obtained control of the Provincial Government; and they have added deficit year after year, ever since.

We shall not impose taxes without consulting the people, was another Liberal pledge that has been deliberately broken.

We shall keep down the public debt; and they have increased the public debt by about half a million of dollars.

We are prohibitionists, said Premier Farquharson and his friends; upon no account will we accept "blood money" or grant a license to a liquor dealer,—but any person in Charlottetown who may pay them \$200 a year is now permitted (licensed) to sell liquor.

Now they are about to ask the people of Belfast and Murray Harbor to pass a vote of continued confidence in their honesty and ability!

CHEESE—AT THE WEST.

Prince Edward Island cheese factories have all done exceptionally well this year. The good pasturage and the unprecedented prices have given the cheese business a decided boom. But the increase over other years is especially noticeable in the newer factories at the western end of the Island.

ALBERTON.

The Alberton cheese factory, situated about a mile from the town, last year had about 125 patrons. This year 140 patrons are supplying milk. Ten hundred and eighty boxes of cheese were manufactured last year. This year the make to the end of September was twelve hundred and eighty boxes,—about forty three tons of cheese, and it is expected that when the season closes three hundred more cheese will have been made this year than last year. The cheese has all been sold, the price averaging for the year from 10 to 10½ cents a pound. Last year the average price received was 8.13. The factory will close the first week in November. It was opened on the 6th of June. At the present time about 7000 lbs of milk are being received daily and 12000 lbs on Monday.

TIGNISH AND PALMER ROAD

The Tignish and Palmer Road cheese factory was opened last year. It began operations with 71 patrons supplying milk from 245 cows. This year 156 patrons are supplying milk from 500 cows,—more than double. From the opening up to August 21st the factory averaged 12 cheese a day. From that date to September 25th 10 cheese a day was averaged. All the cheese has been sold with the exception of the October make, at excellent prices. The monthly reports of Mr. F. T. Morrow, the cheese factory inspector, have been very satisfactory, and in every way creditable to the cheese maker, Mr. Geo. J. Murphy, who is considered by the patrons to be a first-class man. The farmers in this part of the country are going into dairying in earnest and it is expected that next year will show another large increase.

Toronto Telegram: It is putting the case altogether too mildly to say that the money flowed like water in North Waterloo. It flowed like whiskey in N. pissing.

Montreal Star: The Conservatives are out of office, the Liberals are not in power, but the Tarteites have the treasury in their keeping; and no one, not even the Liberals themselves, seem to know how they got there. Some of the old Liberals have had the courage to protest against this usurpation of their name and victory. The Huntingdon Gleaner has been pluckily outspoken, and Messrs. Richardson, Oliver and McInnes have been heard from with effect. Other Liberal journals have from time to time warned their leaders that the people distinguished the policy of Jacob under the guise of Esau, and were not minded to tolerate it. But Mr. Tarte has not taken the hint. He still insists upon being "the Liberal party;" and the real Liberal party knows whether or not it likes its seat on the back benches.
