Canada's Responsibility In Middle East Stressed

OTTAWA, July 26 (Special) — Canada should take more responsibility in Middle East problems, Heath Macquarrie, Conservative MP for Queens, declared in the Commons Friday. Speaking in the debate on Canada's foreign policy, he said this country had made great strides in taking a prominent place in the councils of the world in recent years but Canada has been "so neglectful of the Middle East," he added. "We do not have a legacy of ill will there; we are not suspect, and our record is good. That being the case, I think it behooves us to take more responsibility." The junior MP for Queens said he had been impressed in recent years with the development of Canadian diplomatic posts

BANNER YEAR—DEFINITE DROP

Opinions Are Varied On Tourist Volume

Varying opinions are expressed by those in close touch with the local tourist industry. Assessments of the situation to date range from a definite drop in volume from the Summerside area, to a "banner year" predicted by the proprietor of a popular resort near Chaflorette. Mr. Allan MacDonald, district passenger agent for the CNR stated that up to the 21st of July only 48,254 passengers had been transported on the CNR ferries — 26,554 crossing from Tormentine, and 21,900 in the opposite direction. This did not compare favorably he said with July 1957 when a total of 82,967 passengers — 48,547 of whom were incoming — were handled. However Mr. MacDonald's reports showed that passengers ferried in June of this year outnumbered those using the CNR ferries in the same month last year by 2,536. Complete figures for the two months were as follows, the 1958 figure shown in brackets: Borden to Tormentine — 13,717 (15,354); Tormentine to Borden — 17,323 (18,222).

Rededication Services At Tryon United Church

Services of Anniversary and Rededication will be held Sunday at Tryon United Church at 11 a.m. and 7.30 p.m. The Anniversary preacher is the Rev. D. I. MacIntosh, B.A., Chaplain of Mount Allison University. Special music will be rendered by the Choir under the direction of Dr. Peter MacDonald. The rededication of the Church will take place at the morning service, and at the evening service a Pulpit Bible will be dedicated. Activities in connection with the celebration will continue during the week of the 27th. A concert of sacred music will be presented in the church on Tuesday evening. On Wednesday evening the religious drama "Pilgrims of the Way" by Dorothy Clark Wilson will be presented in the Church. On the following evening, Thursday, a congregational picnic is to be held to which members and friends of the congregation are cordially invited. The weeks activities will conclude on Sunday evening with a service of worship at which Dr. L. E. Toonbas, Professor of Old Testament at Drew Seminary is to be the guest preacher. The Tryon congregation has a long and interesting history, and the year 1858 is of very special significance. It marks the 168th anniversary of the first Methodist service conducted in Tryon, and the 141st anniversary of the erection of the original Wesleyan Chapel in the year 1817. As well, 1958 marks the 75th year which the present sanctuary has served as a centre of the religious life of the congregation. Rev. William Grandin came to Tryon in the spring of 1892, when he preached in a log house on the Nathaniel Wright farm, the property now owned by Austin Smith. He was followed in October of 1894 by Rev. William Black who conducted a series of services in Nathaniel Wright's home, with the result that a revival spread throughout the district, and a Methodist Society of twenty members was established. The first Wesleyan Methodist Chapel built in 1817 was destroyed by fire, and was replaced by a second chapel erected in 1837. As the years passed this building was found to be inadequate to meet the demands of a growing congregation, and a new church building, which is the present United Church was erected in 1882. The church building has been completely redecorated inside and out in this 75th Anniversary year. Former members and friends of the Church are invited to join with the congregation in these services and events which serve to commemorate the passing of a milestone in the life of the Tryon congregation.

(Continued from page 1) summit level, as proposed earlier by Russia. At that time Soviet delegate Arkady Sobolev opposed this breakout of the council's talks despite the fact that no immediate solution has been agreed upon during a week of debate. And Friday night the Russian representative was understood to be sitting smugly as a result of Washington's answer—agreed upon by London—to the summit call. The Western reply, as expressed in the text of President Eisenhower's letter released this afternoon, was that the permanent council members here, presumably without delay, meet "to ascertain that a meeting of the kind... is generally acceptable." "If so they should also agree upon a date which would be generally satisfactory." As a result, plans now are under way for an early council meeting to discuss means of handling the projected summit talks within its own framework. The Eisenhower reply—assuming it is accepted in Moscow—would leave the Security Council a blank cheque on reconciling international legal problems involved. This represents a further development in the off-again-on-again progress towards a summit conference since the Middle East erupted again July 14 with the Iraqi revolt which overthrew the pro-Western monarchy there. United States won't stand for a mere pro and con discussion of Khrushchev's charge that the United States and Britain committed war-breeding aggression by sending troops into Lebanon and Jordan. Instead, he said, the U.S. will insist on broadening the debate to include Western accusations that the real cause of the crisis is a Soviet-backed drive to topple independent governments in the area. SURE POINTS FOR REIDS Officials speculated that the prospect of a broad debate touching on such matters as Hungary, the satellites and the Baltic nations Russia grabbed in 1939 might cause Khrushchev to have second thoughts about the desirability of a meeting. Soviet leaders have been acutely sensitive to attacks on these issues. The main purpose of Eisenhower's letter appeared to be to give him room for manoeuvre to strike back to Khrushchev's anticipated barrage of criticism of U.S.-British troop landings in the Middle East.

North River Cow Wins Ton Of Gold

Darling has won two Silver Medals and two Gold Medals and her classification is very good. To qualify for this award a cow must produce at least 2,000 lbs. of fat in 4 consecutive years.

(Continued from page 1) If Khrushchev agrees to this procedure, the White House said, Eisenhower stands ready to attend the heads-of-government meeting. SLOW-DOWN PLAN Eisenhower's insistence that the 11-nation Security Council should first determine whether a summit session is generally desired served to put the brakes on Khrushchev's proposal to rush to New York for a meeting starting next Monday. "The date of July 28 is too early for us," Eisenhower said. U.S. authorities said Aug. 11, a little more than two weeks hence, seemed to be a more acceptable time provided the British and French agree. Prime Minister Macmillan and French Premier de Gaulle would be the other top participants with Eisenhower and Khrushchev, although de Gaulle has said he doesn't like the idea of coming to New York for such talks. In London, a foreign office spokesman welcomed Eisenhower's note. He said: "Her Majesty's government welcomed the United States reply and its support for a special Security Council meeting. We were fully consulted on its terms." In his 700-word letter, Eisenhower served notice that the

Curran and Briggs Company were awarded three contracts, involving over \$800,000, yesterday morning for the paving of four new stretches, totalling 35 miles of Island roads. The longest stretch is 19 1/2 miles from Milton to Cavendish on which Curran and Briggs bid \$444,632. Other tenders were those of Island Construction Co. \$641,795; Morrison and MacRae \$648,306; Warren Maritimes Ltd. \$579,960; and Hayes Paving Co. \$666,337.50. First tenders opened in the office of Hon. George MacKay, Minister of Highways at noon yesterday were for the paving of 7.2 miles from the Trans Canada Bridge and over the new West River Bridge. On this Curran and Briggs bid a low of \$194,160. Other bids were Island Construction Co. \$256,050; Morrison and MacRae \$248,198; and Warrens Maritime \$216,210. Third tenders called were for paving the balance of the Brackley Point Road and the Keppoch Road, a total distance of 7.8 miles. Curran and Briggs won with a low bid of \$199,404. Island Construction Co. bid \$241,430; Morrison and MacRae \$227,575; Warren Maritimes \$199,665.

(Continued from page 1) be cheaper than any 3,500-foot seaward plan, he told Mayor Johnstone. It could be laid without interference with the present system or the necessity to build another pumping station he said. The sewer could also be extended to this alternative outfall off Connelly wharf by running it along the harbor bottom he added. None of these factors could be determined accurately until the preliminary surveys were completed. The Moncton engineer stated. This would require two or three more weeks he said. "Close co-operation among the engineers, the Water Commissioners and the health officers was urged by Councillor Haslam. Constant consultation at all stages should prevent further delays of this nature, he said. Councillors Foster, Hyndman, Boyles, Baker, and Gormley, were unable to attend the emergency session.
