

EPA Adding More Flights For Holidays

GANDER, Nfld. (CP)—Eastern Provincial Airways, expecting to handle a record number of travellers during Christmas week, announced Thursday it is scheduling 30 extra flights for the period this year.

The airline, forecasting 800 southbound passengers will be picked up at Wabush and Goose Bay in Labrador during the week, made a plea for return reservations in advance to facilitate setting up extra flight schedules.

EPA expected to carry nearly 1,000 passengers between New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and more than 400 on a new service from St. Alban's, in the Bay D'Espoir area of Newfoundland, to St. John's and Gander.

Because of the northern areas in which it operates, the airline said it had to cancel 25 per cent of its Labrador flights last year during the Christmas rush.
