Mr Cameron, recently appointed Lieutenant Governor of the North West Territories is 66 years of age, a lawyer, and a rich man. A master in the uses of the "resources of civilization," he was of great service to his party in capturing seats that could not be secured in any other way. When unseated in 1892 for bribery he is said to have acknowledged that one election cost him from \$10,000 to \$14,000.
