The Letellier Matter.

The Montreal Gazette publishes the following dispatch:—

["BY SPECIAL CABLE.]

LONDON, June 17.

The Imperial Government has decided to refer back the Letellier matter to the Dominion authorities. Of course this means M. Letellier's dismissal.

And remarks:—

This exposes the miserable and despicable attempt of the Globe to influence the pending elections in this Province, by publishing a false report of the decision of the Privy Council, and may be regarded as finally disposing of the question, as advised by the Dominion Government.

The Gubernatorial Chair.

SIR ROBERT'S term will soon be up; and, during the week, rumor has been busy respecting his successor. One day it was reported that Senator Haviland was to be our next Governor. The next it was asserted that Senator Montgomery was to be the man. Then the Hon. Joseph Pope was talked of; and last of all it was declared that the Minister of Marine and Fisheries would resign the position he now holds and take charge of Government House. Time has not yet shown who (if any) was right. Sir Robert's term will be up on or about the 4th of July.

Death of the "Prince Imperial."

It is reported that the gallant young son of Napoleon III. and the Empress Eugenie was surprised by the Zulus and put to death. If the report be true the cause of the Bonapartists is lost, and the gray hairs of the beautiful Eugenie will go down in sorrow to the grave.

Prize Medals.

The prize medals which have been exciting wholesome emulation in the Government schools of the city throughout the year, are now on exhibition at the store of Mr. W. W. Wellner. There are seven in all; and they are very tasteful and costly. Two—one a gold and the other a silver medal—are to be presented by E. J. Hodgson, Esq.,—who, we believe, was the first of our citizens to offer such handsome prizes—to two boys who excel in English History; and one—a gold medal is to be presented by Mrs. E. J. Hodgson to the girl who excels in English History. In the centre of each of these medals is a crest under which is engraved,—"IN HOC SIGNO SPES MEA;" and on the border are the words "HODGSON HISTORICAL MEDAL, 1879." F. Brecken, Esq. will give a silver medal to the second best girl in English History. This medal bearing his monogram surrounded by the words "BRECKEN HISTORICAL MEDAL, 1879."

G. W. DEBLOIS, Esq., will present a medal for proficiency in English branches. Under a crest it bears the motto, "JE ME FIE EN DIEU"—surrounded by the words, "DEBLOIS' ENGLISH MEDAL, 1879."

HON. SENATOR HAVILAND will present a medal for proficiency in history, which bears under a crest the motto, "SPES EST IN DEO," and on the border the words, "HAVILAND HISTORICAL MEDAL, 1879."

HON. JOHN LONGWORTH has had prepared a medal for the scholar most proficient in classics. It bears under the crest the motto, "VIRTUTE ET VALORE," and has engraved on the border, "LONGWORTH CLASSICAL MEDAL, 1879."

These splendid prizes will be presented to the successful competitors at the close of the annual examination, which will take place on Friday and Saturday next.

The "Times" on the Political Situation in England.

The Times says there are indications of the approach of a great electoral struggle. The great questions of foreign policy which have occupied the country for the last few years are rapidly approaching a solution for good or harm. When the time comes for the English people to say how the Ministers discharge their trust, they must not fail to bear in mind the difficulties the Government have had to encounter.

By the upsetting of a boat at Bear River, N. S., on Saturday last, three young ladies—two Misses Rice and Miss Sabean—and a young man, Gilbert Welch—were drowned. Allan and David Rice—father of the first married ladies—were in the boat at the time of the accident, and saved themselves by clinging to the rigging.

Attempted Assassination

THE WOULD-BE MURDERER TRACKED A SHORT DISTANCE.

The Victim Dangerously Wounded.

Intense excitement prevails at Sackville, N. B., in reference to the cowardly and dastardly attempt to assassinate Israel Atkinson, on the night of Wednesday last. The following are the facts of the case: About ten o'clock last night Israel Atkinson left Mr. Richardson's store for his home in the lower portion of the village. While proceeding along near Cemetery street a shot was fired at him from behind. He turned around exclaiming

"OH! YOU HAVE SHOT ME,"

and saw a man standing about 40 feet from him on the road side. The man ran down the road in the direction of Richardson's store. Mr. Atkinson managed to walk as far as Drs. Fleming's & Moore's when he was met at the door by Dr. Fleming, who having heard the shot, was coming out to investigate it. Constables Boyce and Cole, with a number of others, attracted by the shot, soon made their appearance and proceeded to look for the would-be assassin by means of lanterns. Tracks were discovered on the road which led across the field to the main road, and from thence through grounds of the Ladies' Academy to Cemetery street, and then the tracks were lost.

LOOKING FOR THE WEAPON.

Sheriff Botsford and Deputy Sheriff Charters arrived at an early hour and, in company with the constables, kept up a search all day, examining the woods in the vicinity with the hope of finding the gun which the assassin had fired, supposing that he had concealed it in his flight, but up to the present the whole affair remains a mystery.

A young man named Charles Coban, who was in Richardson's store when Atkinson was there, says he heard a footstep on the outside walk and saw a face at the window disappearing instantly but did not recognize it. From this it would appear as if the ruffian was watching this victim's movements, but as robbery could not have been his motive—as Atkinson cannot think of a single enemy—it is thought by some he was taken for some one else. Several rumors are afloat.

SUSPICIONS ARE INDULGED IN

by the residents, but as none of these can be placed with any shadow of evidence on any one they cannot be entertained. It is alleged by some that there were two reports of a gun in quick succession, while others claim it was only the echo, but from the manner in which the unfortunate man is riddled, it would be impossible for the shot to scatter so much at a short distance. A large number of what is termed "Goose" shot extended from the shoulders to the hips.

THE MOST DANGEROUS SHOTS

are those that entered the left lung. His case is a serious one, although not altogether hopeless. He feels a little easier. Mr. Atkinson is about 30 or 40 years of age, and is a widower with a number of children. The Sheriff and Constables are using every endeavor to trace the criminal and secure his arrest.
