The Islanders, having settled matters with the Glace Bay Miners concerning last Saturday night's hockey game, can now redirect their efforts towards bettering their position in the League. The road they have to hoe isn't exactly easy for the team nearest them in the standings, the Glace Bay Miners, have been the hottest in the circuit in recent weeks. The Miners, who couldn't pick up a point from the Halifax Atlantics before Christmas are now making hay at the expense of the Haligonians. Twice this week they have taken the measure of the Halifax Club.

From the moment the League started there was never any doubt in coach Don Peniston's mind but that Glace Bay were the best team in the League. Peniston claimed his players were strangers to one another on the ice during the early part of the campaign and it would take them time to get telling. He lost high scoring Tommy Fyles last week but then on the day of the deadline to bring in professional players he picked two choice plums out of Seattle in the persons of Jim Farrell and Bill Myles. To make room on the roster he dropped Bob Cooper and Neil Andrus. With that Peniston figured he was set. A few days earlier when the teams voted on extending the Jan 15 deadline for bringing in pro players Peniston said no. The four clubs had to agree before the deadline could be set ahead.

The Miners suffered their last loss at the hands of the Islanders in Charlottetown a week ago. The following night both they and the Islanders were nearly forced to discontinue operations when the Islanders could not make Glace Bay for a regular scheduled game. Fortunately a happy compromise was worked out between the executives of both clubs. The Islanders loaned the Miners \$500 from Tuesday night's game in New Glasgow and will get the money back when the postponed game is played. If the postponement did nothing else it showed that the forfeiture rule of \$1,000 is not too practical in the Maritimes.

If the clubs had the money the rule would be a good one. However, you can't take blood from a stone and trying to obtain a \$1,000 fine from the Islanders, Miners or the other two clubs is just such a undertaking comparatively speaking. On the other hand it would be nearly pointless to lower the fine to a smaller amount such as \$200 because that amount would not be enough to offset the offense and the Miners' expenses. The \$200 fine might be made a practical rule if the stipulation were made that the game be re-played at a later date.

With regard to the Tuesday night game in New Glasgow, the Islanders claim they would have won the game with a break of two. They trailed 3-2 until the diving over, empty net. Considering the fact that the Islanders played without Don MacLaughlin and without a replacement for Claude Robert they did pretty well. Tonight when they go on the ice against the Millionaires they should have those two extra men.

When Hughie Ropelle joins the Islanders it is likely that he will see service as a centreman, probably between Paul Sandon and Orin Carver. A team needs strength down the centre as was proven by Claude Robert when he was here although Robert would have been quite an addition to a team no matter where he played. Since joining the Senators he scored one goal as Ottawa lost 5-2 to the Montreal Royals last Sunday.

While the Millionaires haven't lost any ground to the League leading Halifax Atlantics in recent weeks they have seen their edge over the Miners and Islanders whittled down considerably. At the moment the Miners are only three points behind them. The Sydney outfit have had a bit of tough luck of late with injuries and one thing or another but at the moment they appear to have a full lineup. They have one more player coming in. He is forward Don Ashbee of the American Hockey League. At one time two years ago it was rumored that Ashbee was heading to Halifax. Those were the days of
