## Benny Carson Pitches No-Hitter As C. And B. Shut Out Royals 3-0

Benny Carson pitched a no-hitter against the R.C.A.F. Royals at the Recreation Centre diamond in Summerside last night and his mates played errorless ball behind him as the Curran & Briggs Juniors eliminated the Air Force team in the semi-final series for the championship of the Island Baseball League, defeating the Royals 3-0.

In effecting his unusual pitching feat, Benny walked five, hit one, and those were the only six to reach first base. Carson struck out fourteen batters, seven in a row, through the fifth, sixth and seventh innings. He had to face MacKenzie, Burns and Cox in that dramatic ninth inning. MacKenzie grounded out to first, Burns struck out and Cox sent a drive right into the pitcher's hands so that Carson really put the finishing touch to his

fine pitching performance by this last catch.

The Construction Crew got eleven hits off Dave and two of their three runs were earned.

Coke Grady led the Curran & Briggs batters with three hits in five trips. Whalen, Walker and Purcell all had a brace of singles. The fielding gems were MacKenzie's jumping catch of Paul Schurman's line drive over second in the first; Maurie Cannon's fine stretch and catch to complete a double play in the first; and Meier's spectacular stop of Walker's scorching grounder in the eighth to throw Neil out at first.

The Curran & Briggs team got a run in the third inning when Brock Grady hit safely to centre and went to second when the ball went through Cox in centre field. Coke Grady batted him home with

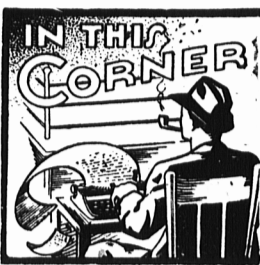

## Cpl. Beatty Continues Lead In Rifle Shoot; Competition Is Keen

Corporal W. N. Beatty, R. C. M. P. won the Governor-General's Silver Medal yesterday for the highest point total in the grand aggregate in the Prince Edward Island Rifle Association Prize Meet following three days of competition at the Squaw Point Range.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police Corporal won the MacDonald Tobacco Company and the W. K. Rogers Memorial Matches yesterday. He won the MacDonald Tobacco Co. Match with a score of 103 out of a possible 105 and he won the other match following a shoot-off with Lieut. Mary MacLennan.

Lieut. MacLennan and Constable R. Barwise tied for second place in the grand aggregate with totals of 517. They will shoot off today for the Governor-General's Bronze Medal, emblematic of second place honors.

Captain Roy MacCabe of Charlottetown won the United Services Officers Club Match with a score of 171 out of a possible 200. The Nicholson Tyro Aggregate was won by Cadet W. D. E. MacDonald with a score of 495.

The Junior Abbies, who last Friday night were probably within an out of being eliminated from the City round-robin baseball series, have written another bright chapter into the history of local ball with their stirring march to the City championship. When they paraded off Memorial Field yesterday evening with the championship securely tucked away they carried with them the results of months of hard practise which together with their fighting spirit and will-to-win has moulded them into what they are today—a winning baseball team.

And the guiding hand behind that moulding belongs to their coach Ev. MacNeill to whom the practise of building championship teams is not a stranger. There are few men in these seaside provinces who had more success with junior players than the soft-spoken MacNeill. From Little Acorns Great Oaks Grow, and so it has been with MacNeill. For the past few years he has been starting from scratch and coming up with champions too often for it to be accidental.

MacNeill perhaps has one point in his favor which the other City coaches do not have. He is handling young players, most of them between 15 and 20 years of age who are in the state of development and who develop in a hurry once they start. In addition to that they have the youthful enthusiasm so necessary in winning games. Most of his players, with few other worries on their minds, concentrate on baseball for the summer months, whether it be through practising, talking, devising plays or dreaming about the game.

The story behind the Juniors rise to success reads something like one of those magazine stories that one seldom expects to come in contact with. Two months ago they were on the verge of throwing in the towel after they had lost four of their better players. At that time practically all they thought they had was a pitcher, a couple of infielders and outfielders and an old chest protector. Hard work and determination, along with good guidance proved differently.

In the first game of the double-round-robin series two weeks ago the Juniors lost 4-2 to M. C. A. In the third game against the Intermediate Abbies the score was tied 4-4 in the sixth inning. A Junior loss and the Intermediate would have won the crown. But things destined for a different end. Two Juniors were out in the seventh inning when they started their rally. At the end of the seventh they led 7-4 and the game was called on account of darkness. From then on they never looked back.

The man who spelled most of the differences in yesterday evening's game was Donnie MacLean. The young right-hander, who is having his best season, gave up only six hits and most of them came when the bases were empty. "Funnell" has a number of great performances to his credit this year, among them a no-hitter. When he meets Benny Carson of the Curran and Briggs Juniors in the Island finals the stands should be full of ball fans for they will see a terrific pitching duel.

To Benny we extend our heartfelt congratulations on his no-hit effort yesterday against the Airmen. In no-hitting the Royals he has accomplished quite a feat for the Airmen probably have more power in their batting ranks than any other team in the league.

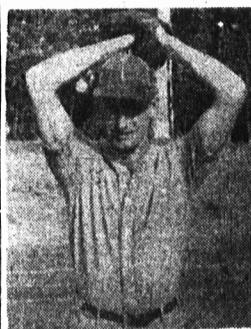

MacKenzie waged a torrid pitching battle before the Juniors finally got to the "Red Fox". Up to that time the Juniors were leading 1-0 as the result of a run in the fourth inning.

Charlie Kennedy, who has finally found his baseball home at second base, struck the big blow in the Intermediates downfall. He hit a sharp single into right field with the bases loaded in the sixth to send two men across the plate with what proved to be the winning runs.

MacKenzie was relieved in the sixth by Charlie Ryan, Ryan got out of the sixth without trouble but in the seventh surrendered two hits and two walks for two runs. This ended the Juniors scoring.
