FROM HALIFAX.—The steamer Pastnet leaves Halifax at six o'clock this evening and will be due here on Wednesday morning.

The steamer Premier leaves Halifax this evening and is expected here on Tuesday evening or early Wednesday morning. She will leave for Summerside after discharging and taking in cargo, and will call here again on her return to Halifax.

The favourite steamer Halifax, of the Canada Atlantic line still continues to be a favourite steamer, as her passenger lists to and from Boston have been larger than usual. This line have secured the magnificent Steamer Olivette, which will run during the summer months in conjunction with the Steamer Halifax forming a tri-weekly service with Boston. With this increased service the popularity of the Halifax route will be largely increased.

POLICE COURT.—This morning John Ring was sentenced to six months imprisonment for malicious injuries to property. The vagrancy, Doyle and McLaughlin, the men charged with obtaining valuable security under false pretences, were further remanded to jail for eight days. One drunk was fined \$4, and two men for disorderly driving were fined \$5 each. There were two convictions of \$25 and costs each for violating the Sunday Observance Law, and two other cases were adjourned and one dismissed.

COURT OF CHANCERY.—The Tenth term of the Court of Chancery opens to-morrow at twelve o'clock, noon. There are two important cases set down for trial, the first, which will be tried before the Master of the Rolls, is an action between parties residing in Belfast to set aside a voluntary deed of settlement on the ground that it was executed to defraud the creditors. The second case will be tried before the Vice Chancellor. It is between the Honorable Donald Farquharson, as plaintiff, and Messrs Benjamin Hearz, William A. Weeks, William D. McKay and others, and is brought to set aside a transfer of certain shares and transactions in connection with the old Charlottetown Woolen Mills. This case will likely be of interest.

French Republicans.

MONTREAL, May 30. A good deal of interest in religious circles here has been caused by a bitter attack in La Patrie by ex-Mayor Beaupre against Father Ruplain, of the Society of Jesus, who preached a sermon a few days ago to the 65th French Canadian Regiment. Referring to France's loss of faith the preacher said that the country was now humiliated and kicked about by every nation in Europe. Whereupon Beaupre and several other French Republicans, probably on the look-out for decorations from President Carnot, accuse the Jesuit Father of ignorance, intolerance and want of patriotism.

Man Drowned.

ST. JOHN, May 30. R. C. Skinner, Judge of Probate, was drowned in the south side of the Miramichi on Saturday, while salmon fishing. The body was recovered.

The Anticosti Survey.

OTTAWA, May 30. The Admiralty have appointed Staff Commander Tooker to survey the south shore of Anticosti Island. The cost will be about \$15,000.

General Telegraphic News.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 27.—A special to the Journal from Wellington, Kansas, says that a cyclone passed over that place this evening, killing and injuring 500 people. The storm passed directly through the centre of the town, wrecking everything in its path. Fire broke out in the wrecked district and is now burning fiercely.

LONDON, May 27.—Considerable gratification has been caused in Liberal and Irish ranks by the announcement that Sir William John Manners Tollemache, Earl of Dysart, one of the most promising and capable of the younger British peers, has declared that he has been converted to home rule, and will no longer set with the Liberal-Unionists. The desertion of Lord Dysart, who is also Lord Lieutenant of Rutland county, has caused a painful impression in Tory ranks, as it is feared other desertions will follow.

QUEBEC, May 27.—An interesting suit is at hand. The Banque de Peuple placed in action against Hon. H. Mercier, C. Beauséjour, M. P., and Hon. C. Laugel for \$4,902, the amount of a promissory note.

MONTREAL, May 27.—A cable received from London to-day announces that debentures which the Canadian Pacific placed on the market to the extent of \$2,000,000 had been more than subscribed for at the rate stipulated in the prospectus.

NICE, May 27.—James Weibregg, said to have been an American from New York, shot himself in the early part of this month in the Casino at Monte Carlo. He is said to have lost all his money, about \$20,000 at the gambling tables.

TORONTO, May 27.—The royal commission on the cruiser colonization, says the Globe's cable, has just issued its third report. It states that Manitoba settlers have prepared 3,500 acres for cultivation, against 2,200 last year. The total value of buildings and stock is about \$16,000 sterling.

The Canadian Fisheries.

(Daily Bulletin.)

HALIFAX, May 30.

Nova Scotia—Codfishing continues excellent at Lunenburg; good at Digby and Liverpool; and fair at Port Medway. Mackerel still plentiful at Lunenburg, good at Liverpool, where boats average 4 barrels, and a few at Whitehead, while they are reported schooling off Yarmouth. Lobsters good at Digby; fair at Port Medway and Isao Harbor, and a few at Liverpool, Lunenburg, Whitehead and Canso. Herring very plentiful at Lunenburg and Gasperaux; plentiful at East Pubnico; good at Port Medway, and a few at Liverpool; salmon good; haddock fair, and halibut fair at Port Medway, Liverpool and Digby, respectively.

Cape Breton—At St. Peters some boats had two barrels mackerel, and reported fair at L'Ardoise and a few at Arichat and Ingonish, those at latter place being first of the season. Light catches of herring at Bras d'Or, Lake L'Ardoise and Ingonish; fair of lobsters and a few herring at St. Anne, and a few lobsters at Arichat; codfishing fair at St. Anne, but poor at L'Ardoise and Meat Cove. Weather continues very strong. A few haddock and gasperaux at L'Ardoise and Ingonish, respectively; at Mabou all kinds of fish are scarce.

P. E. Island—Lobsters fair at Miminigash. No other reports to-day.

New Brunswick—Cod, haddock and sardines very plentiful. Hake good and gasperaux fair at Campobello, boats averaging four quintals cod, four quintals haddock and two quintals hake. Good catches of lobsters reported at Caraquet.

Magdalen Islands—Cod, haddock and lobsters continue poor.

Quebec—At Grand River cod are good, herring fair, while at Gaspé salmon continue fair.

Bait—Herring bait by fishermen's nets at Lunenburg, Arichat, and on bay shore above Digby Gut.

Ice procurable at Digby, Lunenburg and Arichat.
