This Grave Feed Situation Needs Practical Solution

"What day is this?" a farmer visiting Alderlea this evening queried. "They come and go so fast" he declared with a chuckle. "I sometimes hardly know where we're at!"

The younger farmer, having finished a tour of duty at the barns had come by also to join us to talk shop, which because the occupation has such a surprisingly wide range, includes any number of subjects. The existing and rather grave feed situation on farms and probable ways of dealing with this were discussed; of adding this and that imported meal to the rations at hand, and of using substitute materials for bedding to help out with this problem. And with the younger farmer interjecting drily, "I have noticed that many projects proposed for the farmers work out better on paper than in actual practice!" they sought a solution to those problems which these times face the smaller family-farm, where the operator, finds himself as one pointed out, "tied up for lack of more land."

And James reckoned if he were again a beginner at the operation, he would "think things over and," with a boyish grin, as he quoted an old-time, and fairly successful farmer, "proceed cautiously." He would, "start at the bottom and work up by degrees." He would farm with a team, if he were on a smallish holding, so to cut down on the often alarming expenses, which go with today's more ambitious undertakings in this line.

"Yes, I'd have a team. And a few head of cattle. A sow, or perhaps, two," he smiled, "since pigs can still be regarded as good 'morgage-lifters.' And a few sheep to help keep the weeds in control. A fellow, he nodded "would neither have to make so much, nor spend so much, but could have a reasonable happy life." "Oh, James!" we protested. "At the same time, pictured in his words an appealing scene of pure content.
