

# Saints Swamp S.U. 86-46 In Junior Hoop Opener

St. Dunstan's University's Junior basketball team trimmed St. Joseph's University 86-46 in the opening game of a home-and-home total-point series in the Maritime Junior semi-finals, at the S.D.U. Gymnasium Saturday night.

The Saints will carry their 40-point lead into the second game to be played at Moncton on Thursday afternoon.

From the time center John (Hondo) Kelly put Saints into a 2-0 lead scoring two fouls shots in the first minute of the game, the winners were looking over their shoulders at the shorter St. Joseph's squad, who fouled hard but couldn't get within more than 8 points after the Saints had built up a fast 19-7 lead.

**MACGUGAN TOPS**

Lanky Lorne MacGugan rammed home 9 field goals for 18 points to lead the Saints on the offensive and played a great game throughout. Kelly was a close second scoring 17. Captain Bob Fearon and Chick Morrison each had

13 and Gerald Tingley ran wild in the second half scoring 6 baskets for all of his 12 points.

Little Pat Murray racked up 18 points on 7 field goals and 4 foul shots to lead the visitors Jean Richard, another little fellow, as basketball players go, had 7 points and played a terrific floor game dribbling and setting up his teammates beautifully.

**LEAVE EARLY**

Fearon and Pete McGonnell of Saints left the game early in the second half after picking up 5 personal fouls. St. Joseph's lost the services of Murchland in the second half by the same token.

Saints made good on 16 of 28 foul shots and St. Joseph's hit on 18 of 34.

After Saints rushed into their 19-7 lead in the opening minutes of the game St. Joseph's outscored them 5-1 in the next couple of minutes to cut the lead to 20-12. However Saints moved ahead again and led 36-26 at halftime. MacGugan, Kelly, Fearon and Morrison carried the attack in this half racking up 35 of the 36 points. Fearon had 12, Morrison 9, Kelly 8 and MacGugan 6.

Saints quickly went ahead 46-32 early in the second with Kelly and MacGugan hitting for five of the baskets and moved away to 52-32 minutes later.

With a 20-point bulge to work on the Saints began to play it wide-open and with less than 5 minutes to play held a commanding 76-30 lead.

Saints outscored St. Joseph's 50-20 in the second half with MacGugan, Tingley and Kelly spearheading the attack. MacGugan and Tingley each dunned 6 field goals for 12 points a d Kelly had 9 points.

## Badges And Sweat Winsloe Trips Milton 8-2 In North River Loop

TORONTO (CP)—The lack of Canada badges and the poor quality of sweat suits issued to Canadian oarsmen at the 1956 Olympic Games was criticized here Saturday.

The Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen suggested that as the governing body of rowing in Canada, it have complete control over the outfitting of oarsmen with sweat suits at the next Olympics.

"The sweat suits were a disgrace," Jack Guest, Sr., of Toronto, the rowing manager, said. "Apart from that they were useless to men over six feet tall and once they were laundered would not even fit the shorter men."

Guest told delegates that trading national badges was an Olympic institution. He said the Canadians were both embarrassed and humiliated over a shortage of Canada buttons.

The early motorists, brave and hardy souls that they were, put up with some silly laws on their Sunday drives, and they put up with a lot more.

Farmers were their particular enemies, although there were lots of townfolk who had crippling laws passed, too. The dust fairly obliterated the sky on back country roads and there was the old suspicion that the snorting autos turned the milk of cows sour.

A farmers' fad that caught on almost nationwide was to jury old rakes, barbed wire and, Lord help us, even cross cut saws into the roads. They did a dandy job of slashing tires.

I remember my grandfathers' stories of his first car, which incidentally was one of the first on the island, in addition to dusters, goggles, etc. One of the necessities was a water pistol filled with ammonia just to keep the dogs at a respectable distance.
