No doubt, from the very abrupt manner in which he dismissed the meeting, he must have felt that something is not right. I would suggest that he try his hand on the minister—get them all together, have a thorough catechizing, and see if they are genuinely converted—no drinking beer and light wines, no smoking, no pride and jealousy—then there might be a change. I wonder how a certain clergyman can hold his head so high when there are dozens of families attending his church in this city who have been here not put his foot since he has been here.

NEWS NOTES.

The formal opening of the Midwinter Exposition at San Francisco took place on Saturday last under most favorable conditions.

A despatch from Berlin says that the Emperor has deferred his visit to Friedrichshagen until April 1, Prince Bismarck's birthday.

Canadians should feel particularly thankful to the American coal kings. The latter have decided not to advance the price of coal.

Two hundred carpet weavers who struck work at Taylor & Sons' carpet mill at Philadelphia, have returned to work at the old wages.

Le Fleche, the wonderful English mare, by St. Simon, out of Quiver, has been retired to the stud. Baron Hirsch devoted the mare's winnings exclusively to charity.

A Vienna despatch says the appointment of Count Herbert Bismarck as German ambassador to the Austrian court is regarded as a "very possible event."

The winter carnival opened at Quebec on Monday last. The city was thronged with visitors, among them being a party of New Yorkers, headed by John Jacob Astor.

Harry Hitchens, the noted professional printer of England, recently tried to over the records for 120 and 220 yards. His times were 11 4/5 seconds for the short and 21 4/5 seconds for the long distance.

It appears that 13 of the 21 members of the legislative council of Nova Scotia are pledged to its abolition, and that a majority of these men are either shirking their responsibility or violating their pledges outright. These dishonest politicians are receiving support from the Halifax Herald and other opposition papers.

The Honolulu Chamber of Commerce has sent a report on trade to Mr. Bowell and asks that the Canadian tariff be modified so as to admit ordinary Hawaiian sugar free. The Chamber will send a representative to Ottawa to take part in the conference on the Pacific cable and trade matters.

The British consul in the Behring Sea area received 7,500 guineas each for their services in the arbitration. Sir Charles Russell and Sir Richard Webster are very eminent and able lawyers, and the Canadian Gazette says they were not paid a penny more than would have been received by them in the ordinary British courts. The Canadian consul will probably get something less than \$39,000 though he had a good deal more work than his colleagues. Sir Charles Russell has an official income as Solicitor-General of \$35,000, besides fees amounting to \$25,000, and is, therefore, in the enjoyment of a fair return for his labors.
