

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Oct. 1.

Lord Mount Morris was buried at Monkstown to-day. There was no demonstration.

The Corporation of Cork has decided to participate officially in the Parnell demonstration on Sunday next. Parnell will receive the freedom of the city of Limerick.

A proclamation has been issued in Ireland offering £1,000 reward for the apprehension of the murderers of Lord Mount Morris.

RAGUSA, Oct. 1.

The fleets are concentrating at Negline. Russian sloop Zemeouge will leave on Friday and the other ships will follow on Saturday and Sunday.

The Foreign Office has received a telegram from Admiral Seymour, pronouncing the burning of Dulcigno untrue.

The Times says the aspect of affairs in the East gives reasonable ground to hope that pacific execution of the treaty of Berlin will be found in the united action of the powers. Pressure upon Turkey will now cease to be merely local, but it will be the object of the united Cabinets through their representatives at Constantinople to extort from the Porte concessions granted by the Treaty of Berlin. Meanwhile, it is a matter of significance that the alliance of the powers so far from losing strength through the interposition of obstacles imperfectly foreseen has probably acquired new force from the trial.

VIENNA, Oct. 1.

In the Hungarian Diet the subject of Austrian participation against Turkey was taken up. A question was put in reference to the naval demonstration, the Government being asked whether it would use its influence that no force be employed, and whether if its efforts be unsuccessful, Hungarian forces will be engaged. Although the question comes from the extreme side, it may be taken as a sign of current feeling, which has set in not only in Hungary, but to judge from some of the chief organs of public opinion, in Austria likewise.

PARIS, Oct. 1.

It is semi-officially declared that the French Government while adhering to the action of the Powers in the East is perfectly resolved not to separate from the European concert.

LONDON, Oct. 1.

A great public meeting will be held in London soon, under the auspices of the Patriotic Association, to protest against the coercion of Turkey.

A very strong reaction is setting in this country against the merciless way in which European action is being carried on in the East, and against Austria participating further in coercive measures.

The Daily News' leading editorial says: "The Cabinet Council yesterday had before it the request of the Porte that no further action be taken by the Powers before Sunday. This interval of grace will probably be granted. There is not the slightest intention on the part of the British Government to swerve from their direct policy, but other Powers must be consulted regarding the course to be taken if the Porte's decision Sunday shall prove unsatisfactory. Much depends on the attitude of Austria which will control that of Germany. Should these go with other Powers, Italy would probably co-operate. France would at least not hamper their action and Russia would be unable to develop any adverse policy of its own. But even if the great Powers do not agree we don't believe the British Government would hold themselves relieved from the necessity of further action."

MELBOURNE, Oct. 1.

The International Exhibition opened to-day.

ROME, Oct. 1.

Minotti Garibaldi denies that Major Canzolo's arrest was the cause of himself and his father resigning from the Chamber of Deputies.

LONDON, Oct. 1.

A thousand tons of the cargo of the Canopus has been discharged. Divers report the steamer firmly bedded on the rocks. She does not leak much at present. Her passengers will leave Liverpool in the steamer Pharos on Saturday.

Thos. Carlyle is dangerously ill.

PARIS, Oct. 1.

Radicals, Reactionaries and many Republicans are denouncing Gambetta as the sole promoter of the warlike policy in the East, and are demanding the convocation of the Chambers in order that the country may decide the question.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.

The French Canadian National Democratic Club, of this city and vicinity, tonight elected delegates to the National Convention of French Canadian meeting at Springfield, Mass., Oct 5th and 6th.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 1.

The stage between Pearce City, Mo., and Eureka Springs, Ark., was stopped Wednesday, two miles from the former place, by six masked, well armed men, and the passengers (eleven men and one woman) robbed.

MONTPELIER, Oct. 1.

Considerable excitement prevails here over the supposed murder which came to light this afternoon by the finding in the river of the body of Joseph Dumas, of Northfield, with wounds upon his head and other indications of foul play. Dumas left his home in Northfield last Monday to bring a man and wife named Stone to Montpelier, which he did, putting up his team at Union House. He was last seen on Monday evening quite drunk. As he did not return home, some anxiety was felt by friends, and search here showed that he had not been seen since Monday. His team remained at the hotel. Stone and wife were arrested at Northfield on suspicion of having killed him.

THE New Brunswick Railway has been purchased by a Montreal Syndicate, of which George Stephen is the head.

HENRY LONGWORTH, Esq., and Malcolm McLeod, Esq., both of this city, were registered at the "Hotel Dufferin," St. John, on Friday evening last.

APPLES FOR THE ENGLISH MARKET.—The steamship Australia, which left Halifax Wednesday, for London, took, as part of her cargo, 911 barrels and 25 boxes Nova Scotia apples. The Nova Scotian, which sailed for Liverpool, also took 1,432 barrels and 51 boxes, the total export being 2,343 barrels and 76 boxes.—St. John Telegraph.

The cloth was the manufacture of Mill Valley Cloth Mills, of which Mr. Wm. Gordon is agent in this city; and the suit was cut and made by Mr. James McLeod, of the firm. That the Hospital may go on increasing in utility and popularity, from day to day in the future as in the past, will be my constant prayer. Wishing you farewell, Believe me dear Sir, your most obedient servant.
