BRITISH PARLIAMENT

The Queen's Speech.

The Government's Home Policy.

LONDON, Jan. 21. Her Majesty's speech to-day said her relations with other powers continue friendly. Differences with Russia regarding the Afghan boundary have been satisfactorily adjusted.

The Queen regrets that she had to declare war against King Tsebar, of Burmah, owing to acts of hostility by himself and subjects. The gallantry of the forces under Gen. Pendergast had rapidly overthrown the Burmese forces; and she decided that the most certain method of ensuring peace was to be found in the permanent incorporation of Burmah with her Empire.

The negotiations respecting the rights of the French on the coast of Newfoundland had been satisfactorily concluded. Turning to internal affairs, the Queen said: "I regret to say that no material improvement can be used in the condition of Trade or Agriculture. I have seen with deep sorrow, the renewal since I last addressed you, of the attempt to excite the people of Ireland to hostility against the Legislative Union between the country and Great Britain. I am resolutely opposed to any disturbance of that fundamental law, and in maintaining it I am convinced that I shall be heartily supported by my parliament and my people.

The social no less than the material condition of that country engages my attention. Although there has been during the last year no marked increase of crime, there is in many places a concerted resistance to the enforcement of legal obligations, and I regret that the practice of organized intimidation continues to exist. I have caused every exertion to be used for the detection and punishment of these crimes, and no efforts will be spared on the part of my government to protect my Irish subjects in the exercise of their legal rights and the enjoyment of individual liberty.

Bills will be submitted for transferring to representative councils in the courts of Great Britain, local business which is now transacted by the courts of quarter sessions and other authorities. A measure for the reform of county government is also in preparation for Ireland.

In these and all other matters pertaining to your high functions, I earnestly commend you to the keeping and guidance of Almighty God.

The Death Sentence

CARLISLE, Jan. 21. The trial of James Baker, James Martin and Anthony Benjamin Rudge, charged with committing robbery at Nethaby Hall on October 26, with shooting Sergt. Proche and a police constable with intent to murder them at Kingston, with committing a murderous assault on police constable Fortune, and with the murder of police constable Byrne at Plumpton, has been concluded. All three prisoners were convicted and sentenced to death.

Shocking and Fatal Accident.

BANGOR, Jan. 21. A shocking accident occurred about four miles from Brownville yesterday, by which a Mr. Perham was instantly killed, and a Mr. Evans injured. Latest reports say he cannot live. Physicians were summoned to the place from all towns near by.

A Young Girl Buried Alive.

In the early part of last week the people of Woodstock, Ont., were shocked by the announcement of the sudden death of a girl named Collins while playing on the street with her schoolmates. The body was moved from where it had been buried to the family plot, and the parents wishing to view the remains had the coffin opened, when to their horror they discovered that a dreadful struggle must have taken place after burial. The shroud had been torn into shreds, the knees were drawn up to the chin, one of the arms was twisted under the head and the features bore evidence of dreadful torture—unmistakable proofs that life was not extinct when the interment occurred.

Despite the fact that the tenants on the Irish estates of the Earl of Listowel pledged themselves not to pay any rent unless a reduction of 30 per cent. was made, over half of them have, during the past week, paid up in full. The tenantry of the Duke of Devonshire are paying their rents freely at the 20 per cent. reduction recently granted by the Duke.

In the Southern States the solid vote is disappearing, and as it departs a better feeling between the north and south, and between the white and black makes its appearance. Many negroes are turning Democrats and many whites are going over to the Republicans. In fact the period of free thought and free action has struck the south, and its beneficial results are already appearing. The experience of that section should teach Canada how undesirable it is that the cleavage between political parties should be coincident with the line of division between two races.
