For dearily do we wish to relax, to forget ourselves, to laugh. Not all of us of course laugh at the same thing but certainly the same things make most of us laugh. Or why do comedians on the stage, screen, over the air-waves and through the comic strips draw such fabulous salaries?

Since drawing laughs in Big Business comedians do not depend on inspiration for their humor or jokes. Day in day out whatever their state of health or personal problems, they must continue to be funny and win the applause of their public and—keep it. Seriously, methodically, each joke, each piece of humor is analyzed, is made to fit a certain recognized pattern for laugh-getting.

DRAW ON PAST

The Sandwich Idea Contest, recently conducted by the National Restaurant Association and the Wheat Flour Institute, selected three winners.

Over 750 sandwich ideas from restaurants and hotels were submitted. After careful evaluation by qualified home economists, the 20 best were sent to New York for final judging.

It was an interesting experience. I know, for I was one of the final judges. The ideas were new and exciting, the prizes were awarded for originality, tastiness and garnish appeal.

But try the prize-winning recipes and judge for yourself.

FIRST PRIZE WINNER
Pan-Fried Filet of Beef Sandwich (from Lloyd W. Rook, National Food Service, Inc. Louisville, Kentucky).

Spread 8 slices deconstructed, toasted enriched sandwich bread with butter or margarine. For each sandwich, cut 2 pieces into diagonal strips. Top with pan-cooked 4-oz. servings of beef tenderloin. Arrange on the toast. Garnish with mushrooms and parsley.

Pan-cooked Tenderloin: Melt ¼ c. butter or margarine. Add 1 minced section garlic; cook 3 min.

Add and brown 4 (4 oz.) servings beef tenderloin. Cover and cook 10 min.; baste occasionally. Remove tenderloin.

To pan drippings, add ½ c. butter or margarine. In this, brown ½ lb. cleaned, sliced fresh mushrooms (13 c. sherry optional) and ¼ c. hot water. Simmer 15 min. to blend flavors.

A Man's Army Shown Up By The Lady Lieutenant

The story is of marked interest in the great metropolis of New York but it is of special significance in this province because the young lieutenant referred to is Sally Osborne, who is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Osborne, Brackley Point Road.

There is an action picture of pretty Sally with pointed gun and the caption "Sally Osborne at Home on the Range." The following is the article.

Fort Dix, N.J. — The men who face the rigors of the tough Army training tests and infantry assault course won't be able to complain anymore. Not out loud, at least, and it's because of a rugged Long Island miss.

The lady who gagged the Army's training grippers is Sally R. Osborne of Uniondale, a pretty 25-year-old brunet and a First Lieutenant in the WAC Reserve. Sally not only went through the training tests and assault course last week, along with 200 male MP reservists, but she also completed a score of 91.5 out of a possible 100 points and thus beat all but handful of the 200 MPs.

"They weren't going to let me go through the tests," Sally said. "But I convinced them. I wanted to get a frank estimate of my own capabilities." Sally said that as far as she knows she is the only woman ever to have taken the tests, which include such rugged training trials as disarming mines, infiltration through barbed wire, grenade throwing and racing

Sally is the daughter of a Canadian highhouse keeper and an American Red Cross nurse. She joined the WAC in 1954 and served until last January. During that time she became an American citizen.

Sally's plan is to return to active duty with the WAC. "I'm in the Army," she said. When asked why she left the corps in January, she said: "That's what I've been asking myself ever since. Was the worst mistake I ever made in my life." She now is the only qualified female lieutenantman in the U.S.A.
