Local and Other Items.

GLASS WORKS ACTIVE.—The Glass Works at Trenton, N. S., are again in full operation.

AT IT AGAIN.—It is now said that Hon. Mr. Blair, minister of railways has given an order for three Russell winged elevator plows for the I. C. R. to a United States firm.

HE GOT THE WORD.—Hearing that Kipling's new book had cost its publisher a shilling a word, a London wag wrote the author saying that as wisdom was quoted at retail prices he would like one word, for which he enclosed a postal order for a shilling. Kipling kept the order and answered with the word "Thanks."

ILL IN NEW YORK.—Early last week Mr. D. J. Gallagher of the City Cornet Band received word that his father, Mr. John Gallagher, was seriously ill in New York where he has resided for a few years. Later word came that he had improved. Mr. Gallagher lived for over half a century in St. John and has many friends who will wish for his speedy restoration to health.—St. John Telegraph.

BIG BANK ROBBERY.—The Kirkshire Savings Bank at Macon, Mo., was recently entered by burglars and robbed of \$14,000 in government bonds belonging to Samuel Reed, president, and something in the neighborhood of \$18,000 in gold and greenbacks. Two or three thousand in silver was left, evidently being too heavy, and \$2,000 in the vault was overlooked by the robbers.

THE TROUBLE-SOME BLACKS.—The negro is a problem in Illinois as well as in North Carolina. At Paoli, in the former state, where no union negro miners have been imported, both whites and blacks are in a turbulent mood. The negroes have been heavily armed by the mine operators, and are shooting at any white man that passes their quarters. The residences of several white miners were shot into by Winchester in the hands of colored men.

UNUSUAL ACCIDENT.—While a C. P. R. freight train was crossing the prairie east of Shuswap, which is the second station east of Kamloops the boiler of the engine exploded from what cause is not yet known, and killed the engineer, James Little, and a brakeman, E. Reid. The top of the cab of the locomotive was blown up on a telegraph pole, and the tender and two cars were wrecked. The fireman was badly scalded, but escaped with his life.

BAD GAS EXPLOSION.—An explosion of gas occurred one night last week in the basement of the central portion of the Capitol at Washington, beneath the Supreme Court room and the Court library. Fire followed the explosion, and a priceless collection of books has been destroyed. The damages of the building is estimated at \$200,000. The entire central eastern portion of the great marble pile is practically a mass of ruins. The records lost were very valuable.

NOT SO GREEN.—On the promise of expenses paid, Samuel Lewis, a compositor of London, Ont., went to New York, to buy \$4,000 in counterfeit United States money for \$300 in genuine Canadian money. He also expected to meet and marry a rich widow, who had corresponded with him through a matrimonial bureau. There is reason to believe that the matrimonial bureau and the green goods man were in collusion. At any rate, Lewis "came on," and was met by a gentleman, who subsequently gave his name to the police as Willis Parker. Parker passed a few \$10 notes on his "cappers" in various saloons, and then asked Lewis to buy. Lewis, who had begun to smell a rat, said he would take \$34 worth, and high words ensued. While they were wrangling a policeman came along and ran them both in. The Canadian was held on the charge of carrying a revolver, so that his attendance as a witness against Parker might be sure.

WHERE LIVING IS HIGH.—The Ottawa Citizen says: Con-nd McCook writes from Dawson City describing the high cost of living and property in the city and immediately surrounding region. "A dinner costs \$2.50, and breakfast and lunch \$1.50. Lodging is \$1.50 per night in a bunk, and a hotel charges \$6.50 for a bed per night. The price of property in the business locality is enormous. A lot of convenient size upon the main street can not be had under \$40,000. Lots in the bog off Main street bring from \$5,000 to \$10,000. To rent a log cabin costs \$200 a month. The prevailing price of labor is \$1 per hour. The counsel strongly advises against any but the best equipped and richest prospectors coming to Dawson. The prospector, he says, should have at least enough provisions to last over winter, and enough money in bank to take him home if he is unsuccessful. He is appealed to daily by men who have no money and can not get work.

It Was Manslaughter.

LONDON, Nov 14.—The coroner's jury which has been investigating the death on October 19th last, of Harold Frederic, the correspondent of the New York Times, rendered a verdict to-day of manslaughter against Kate Lyon, a member of the late Mr Frederic's household, and Mrs Mills, a Christian scientist.

INTERESTING EVENT.—The Pioneer reports that last Tuesday evening a very enjoyable time was spent by a large number of invited guests at the home of Mr and Mrs Linkletter, of Linkletter Road, the occasion being the celebration of their 50th wedding day. Not only was it the celebration of their golden wedding but the birthday of Mr and Mrs Linkletter's youngest daughter and also of one granddaughter. Between 60 and 70 guests were present and the evening was spent in music and discussing a splendidly got up supper and other topics of interest. Amongst the latter were several of special note. For instance, Mr John Sharp, of Linkletter Road, who was best man at the wedding which took place 50 years ago at the Presbyterian manse at North Bed-que, the late Rev R. S. Patterson officiating, was present looking hale and hearty; and Mr Linkletter has still in his possession the same wagon in which he drove his bride upon that happy day to his home. Mr and Mrs Linkletter were the recipients of many handsome and valuable presents including a number of gold coins and a gold-headed walking cane.

A FORTUNATE CHURCH.—By the decision of Chief Justice Meredith, the Erskine Presbyterian Church of Toronto receives a bequest of \$10,000. In 1888 Mr Daniel Bowerman died, having made a will eight years previously, under whose terms Erskine Church was to be paid \$10,000 on the death of the testator's widow and brother. Although these conditions were fulfilled, the residuary legatees contested the will. Last week Chief Justice Meredith decided that the bequest was perfectly legal, and the \$10,000 was paid over to the church, with interest at 6 per cent, dating from 1888.
