Dunkerque Vets See Famous Beach From Steamer

DUNKERQUE, France, June 1 —(Reuters)—More than 1,400 British veterans of the historic Battle of Dunkerque came back today to look at the beach they evacuated just 10 years ago, but the red tape of the post-war world kept them from landing.

Most of the veterans had come unexpectedly, and few had passports. So they had to stay on the deck of the Channel steamer Royal Daffodil and gaze at the beach which they last saw in the midst of a bloody withdrawal.

The Royal Daffodil, a pre-war pleasure boat, had not been back here either since she took part in the evacuation.

Today she came to fetch Mayor Gustave Robelet of Dunkerque, eight of his councillors and 12 French Dunkerque veterans to take them to a commemoration ceremony at Margate, on the Kent coast of England.

The people of Dunkerque cheered when the Royal Daffodil steamed into the harbor bringing not only Mayor C. B. Hoskins of Margate and his councillors, but the unexpected crowd of British veterans.

There was cheering on land and water as the ship steamed up to the Panama Quay, with all flags out and decked with a new coat of white, green and yellow paint.

Some wearing their uniforms, others only their medals on civilian suits, the British veterans gazed at the ruins of Dunkerque while the two Mayors toured the port together.

The Dunkerque municipal delegation will return from Margate June 3 to greet Dunkerque veterans from all over Britain who will take part in the solemn commemoration of their greatest battle.

Forest fire statistics that included figures for Newfoundland for the first time. Excluding Newfoundland, the number of man-caused fires in the remaining nine Provinces topped the 1948 total by more than 1,000. This, said Mr. Winters, was an increase of 23 per cent over 1948. More than 2,500,000 acres were burned over by fires last year, an increase of almost 40 per cent over the previous 10-year average. In damage to timber, young forest growth and other property, it represents a financial loss of nearly \$6,000,000 based on prevailing stumpage rates, the report said. It added that no reliable estimate could be made of the additional losses incurred by the wood-using industries nor the damage to wildlife, soil and recreational facilities. Cost of fighting the forest fires last year rose to an all-time high of more than \$3,000,000. Pakistan Defends Important Frontier OTTAWA, June 1 —(CP)—Hon. Liaquat Ali Khan, Prime Minister of Pakistan told a press conference that Pakistan is "the one country that is defending the most important Commonwealth frontier." "Many people do not realize that," the dapper, dark-haired visitor told newspaper men, "if they did, they would perhaps pay more attention to Pakistan." Liaquat Ali said Pakistan had a "competent" air force, a small navy and an army "which has some of the finest soldiers in the world." When asked if the Russians had shown any display of strength along the frontier, he replied: "They have not sent me any intimation that they intend doing so." Liaquat Ali told newspaper men that the relations between Pakistan and India had improved greatly during the last 12 months.
