Christian Church Annual Meeting

The annual congregational meeting of the Central Christian Church, Charlottetown was held last night in the church annex with Mr. Keith MacKinnon in the chair. A splendid number were in attendance and keen interest in all phases of the work as given in the various reports was evidenced.

A devotional service was conducted and prayer was said by the Minister, Mr. M. D. Dunbar. Excellent reports were presented by the members of the various departments and an extraordinarily fine gain was shown. The Trustee Board reporting through its secretary, Mr. Wm. L. Henry, spoke of the fine improvement to the manse property in the installation of a constant hot water and oil heating unit. The church premises were completely redecorated and the annex and main auditorium wired and newly lighted.

Carpenters Union Annual Meeting Held Last Night

Mr. Basil Molyneux, Charlottetown, was elected president of the Carpenters and Joiners' Union, Local 1338, at a well attended meeting held last night in the L. P. U. Hall. Mr. J. H. Dwyer, representative for the International Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America addressed the meeting. Mr. Dwyer is also a member of the Montreal Board in Nova Scotia.

The speaker pointed out that the purpose of forming a Union on Prince Edward Island was to bring to the workers in his trade a standard of living comparable to that enjoyed by the tradesmen of other Provinces.

He gave comparable figures for other centres which show the hourly rate being paid. They are: Toronto \$2.20, Cape Breton \$1.90, Halifax \$1.60, Montreal \$1.50. A construction laborer in Halifax receives \$1.16 per hour while in Charlottetown carpenters are receiving between 80c and \$1.00 per hour.

The wage agreed upon by the members present at the meeting was an hour rate of \$1.25 for an eight hour day and time and one-half for the first four hours after eight hours of work. They are to work hereafter on the basis of a 44 hour week with double time to be paid on Sundays and holidays.

Other officers elected at the meeting were: vice president, Leonard Farrell; financial secretary, Vincent Dalton; recording secretary, Hazelton Phalen; treasurer, William Shields; conductor, John Steel; trustees, Peter Creamer, John MacDonald, and Joseph McQuill.

Mr. Parker Discusses High School Project

The new Junior High School is designed to give a better deal in educational opportunity for our boys and girls" said Mr. R. A. Parker, Superintendent of City Schools in an address before three hundred members of the Parent-Teacher organizations of Prince Street and West Kent Schools last evening. Many parents of children in other city schools were also present.

"That the decision is a momentous one goes without saying," Mr. Parker said. "That it was not a hasty decision made without careful and detailed study of the educational needs of the city, is obvious from the record. The need of more adequate high school facilities for Charlottetown's youth has been recognized for years.

"Various organizations at different times have presented briefs and recommendations to the Board of School Trustees asking for action. Due to such representations from the School Improvement League Board of Trade, recommendations from the Principals and other groups, a High School committee was formed by the Board, under the chairmanship of Mr. Earle Baker."

The decisions reached in connection with the new High School are based on the findings of the Maturation survey which was presented a year ago," the speaker explained. "Although the major recommendation called for the provision of a complete High School program, both academic and vocational, the Board has felt that this is not the opportune time to embark on such an ambitious and expensive project". Mr. Parker continued. "Hence the decision to concentrate on the Junior High School level."

Curriculum Pattern

"Due to the pattern of the traditional curriculum for the province, which prepares students at the end of the 10th year to write entrance papers to Prince of Wales College it was necessary to include Grade 10, usually considered the first year of Senior High, in the program of the new school. For the time being, at least, those students who successfully complete the academic program on the Grade 10 level will continue their high school work leading to Junior Matriculation at Prince of Wales College. Only the future can determine whether it will be desirable for the city to have its own complete high school curriculum. Ample space has been provided in the new building for this contingency.

"In this connection there is the hope that the new school will in due course be given accredited standing by the Department of Education, thus eliminating the necessity of writing the entrance papers. Those students graduating from our local schools with the Board's School Leaving Certificate have been markedly successful in passing the entrance exams

over the years and the record certainly justifies such consideration. "The limitations of a purely academic program for all students have been recognized for a long time. The fact that less than a third of Charlottetown's boys and girls enrolling in Grade 10 obtain an academic graduation at the end of Grade X and that less than a quarter successfully complete the requirements for an academic matriculation is simply not good enough for this city or any other community. A minimum goal for our boys and girls is to keep them in school for at least

ten years. This cannot be achieved by the restricted academic program which is not designed to meet the needs of all students with their wide range of abilities and interests.

Vocational Program

"In considering this aspect of the problem the Board has decided to offer a modified vocational program, carefully integrated with the basic academic subjects. Taking into consideration that agriculture is the basis of the economy of this province and the comparatively few opportunities for employment in the trades, commerce, and industry, it was felt that there was no justification for an elaborate and comprehensive vocational set-up such as is common in most towns and cities on
