Anglican Church Committee Gives Report On Reformatory

TORONTO (CP)—A report by an Anglican Church committee investigating conditions at the Millbrook Reformatory near Peterborough says the location of the centre is "unsuited to a program of reform and rehabilitation."

At a press conference the eight-man committee announced it found five faults in the operation of the maximum-security prison:

1. Selection of Millbrook as the reformatory's site was an error.
2. Pay and training for guards is insufficient.
3. Court habits of giving consecutive reformatory sentences is a source of inmate discontent.
4. Millbrook's rehabilitation program is insufficient.
5. The church does not take a great enough interest in rehabilitation and prison affairs.

The report also calls for an increased training course for guards and recommends pay raises for men successfully completing the course. The committee said guards now receive between \$4,000 and \$5,000 annually but salaries should be raised.

OPPOSE LONG TERMS

The report also suggests persons with sentences totalling more than two years be sent to federal prisons. The committee said some prisoners have been sentenced to six years in the Millbrook prison.

The chaplaincy service in reformatories has been improved, members said, but the church in general has not shown "enough interest."

"The church has failed to study reform institutions sufficiently in regard to improving prison service. It has also failed to provide enough visiting chaplains apart from those on the regular staff of the department of reform institutions."

Outspoken Doctor Now Out Of Job

TORONTO (CP)—An Indian-born doctor who led protests against the Ontario College of Physicians and Surgeons' refusal to license doctors from certain Asian countries is no longer working at Toronto Western Hospital.

Dr. Krishna Baichwal, 35 father of two, has been out of work since Dec. 31.

He said the loss of his job may have been due to the fact he was outspoken last summer in criticizing the college which licenses doctors to practise privately.

Max Wallace, administrator of Western, denied that Dr. Baichwal's departure had anything to do with his dispute with the college. The hospital's understanding was that the doctor's training period was due to finish in December, said Mr. Wallace.

The doctor said he understood his verbal contract with the hospital was due to run until next June. He had been at the hospital since June, 1964 as a resident and later clinic assistant and research fellow.

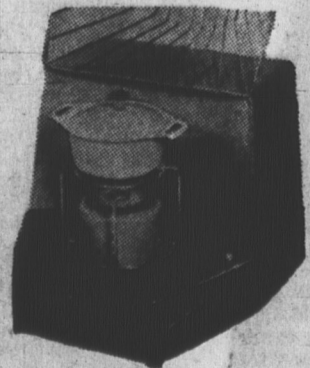
