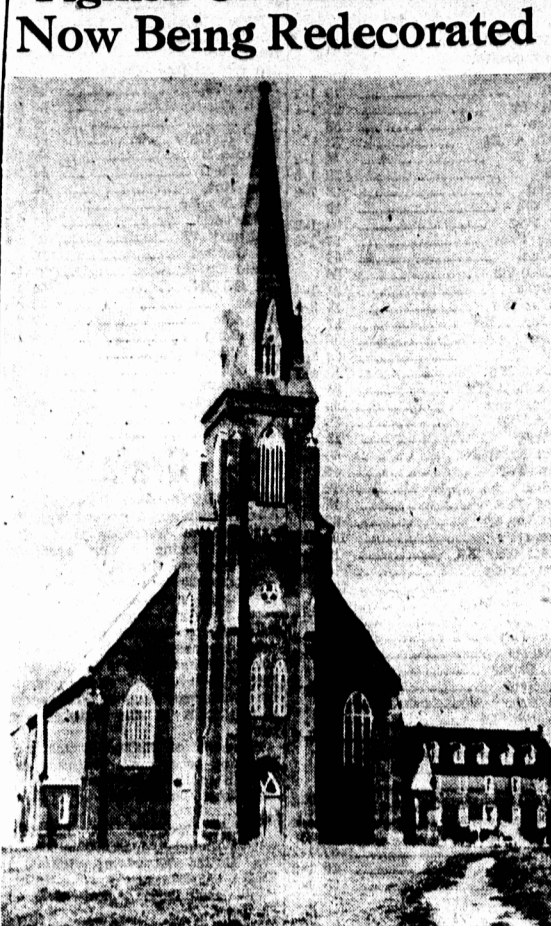

Tignish Catholic Church Now Being Redecorated



Praised not only by the local public but by visiting tourists as well, on the work already accomplished, the parishioners of St. Simon and St. Jude historical Catholic Church of Tignish together with their pastor, Reverend John A. Macdonald, are to be congratulated on their untiring and united efforts to complete the repainting and redecorating the interior of this edifice before the fall season sets in. The work is under the supervision of Adrian Richard assisted by Harold Cormier and Alonzo McInnis. All three are parishioners of this church. The Stations of the Cross, long considered by sculptors and artists as one of the finest in Canada, are being renovated by Miss Mary Shelton of Montreal, a graduate artist of the School of Practical Arts of Boston, Massachusetts. She is a native of this parish and made her preliminary art studies in this Province. This church which is considered one of the oldest and largest in this Province, is of Gothic architecture. It was erected ninety-three years ago by the Right Reverend Peter McIntyre who later became bishop of the diocese. Constructed of locally made bricks the structure measures one hundred feet long by sixty-two feet wide, with walls thirty feet high and a copper covered spire which towers up one hundred and fifty-five feet in height. Mr. P. C. Kiely of New York City was the architect and builder. The first painting and redecorating of the interior of this church was made sixty-three years ago by the noted firm of Melloche and Company of Montreal.
