

Increase Shown In Potato Shipments

Potato shipments from the Province during the month of October were up 61 carloads over the corresponding period last year. A total of 735 cars were moved by land, water and truck last month compared to 674 for October of the previous year. This information is contained in the monthly shipping report of the Fruit and Vegetable Inspection Branch, Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown.

Truck shipments were up this month, with 131 carload lots moved mostly to Nova Scotia. The shipment from the West end of the Island is decidedly lower than for the same period in 1953. There has been a marked increase at such stations as Carleton Place, Kingston and Albany, and while an increase is noticeable in the Eastern end of the Island, it is spread over a larger number of shipping points. The movement to the American market has been small up to the present date. The price has been ranging from \$1.25 to \$1.30 per 75 pounds bulk at the car.

Canadian Military Attache In Moscow

OTTAWA (CP)—Lt. Col. Kenneth L. Campbell, 44, of Toronto, commander of the 1st Battalion, Canadian Guards, will be appointed Canadian military attache in Moscow, army headquarters announced Friday. He will replace Lt. Col. R. C. D. Stewart, 37, of Toronto and leave for Russia early next year. Maj. W. E. Garber, 41, of Bridgewater, N. S., now with the Canadian army staff in Washington, will be promoted to lieutenant-colonel and command the Guards' 1st Battalion early in January.

Former German Field Marshal Dies

BERLIN (Reuters) — Former field marshal Ewald von Kleist, 73, ace German tank commander, has died in Russia, where he was serving a term for war crimes committed in 1945. The British official Communist East German news agency ADN reported Friday. The agency said von Kleist died after a long illness. Von Kleist played a leading military role in the Second World War, mainly in German offensives in Poland Yugoslavia and Russia. He was taken prisoner by British armed forces in 1945. The British extradited him to the Yugoslavs who later handed him over to the Russians.

Social Welfare Bureau Campaign

Plans for the annual campaign for funds for the Catholic Social Welfare Bureau were drawn up at a meeting of the Board of Directors earlier this week. The campaign will get underway the week of Nov. 7, when those on the "special names" list will be contacted. Chairman of the "special names" canvass is Mr. M. A. Farmer. He will be assisted by a team of a dozen volunteer workers.

Sunday, Nov. 14, will mark the official opening of a three-day door-to-door general canvass of the parishioners of the two Catholic parishes in Charlottetown. A team of one hundred collectors will be headed by Basilica chairman Brendan O'Grady, and Holy Redeemer co-chairman Frank O'Neill, Wilfred Duffy and J. T. Place.

Only the Catholic population of Charlottetown and vicinity will be personally contacted, the Board announced, but contributions from other benefactors will be gratefully accepted.

Since this non-profit Bureau was incorporated in 1948 it has served the needy, distressed and unfortunate of the Charlottetown area. It has distributed tons of food, fuel and clothing, placed dozens of orphans in foster-homes, and provided at-home nursing care for hundreds of needy patients. The Bureau's only source of income for this charitable work is the voluntary contributions of the public.

The Catholic Social Welfare Bureau, located at 129 Pownall St., is at present staffed by field secretary Sister Mary Henry, C.S.M., Sister Maria Goretti, C.S.M., and Miss Margaret Campbell, R.N. President of the Board is Mr. Albert Lannan, who is assisted by the following directors: Rt. Rev. Patrick McMahon, Rev. Gregory Murphy, C.S.S.R., Dr. F. A. MacMillan, Dr. L. L. He is entered in this show under Mr. Lushy's name and was the grand champion male. A. D. Neill of Fredericton, N. B.; Walter Lushy, Amherst, N. S.; T. E. Fetherly of Waterville, N. S.; Roy Johnson, Truro; the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, Truro; Vernon Harding, Sussex; Edward Dickie, Truro; Hon. C. B. Sherwood, Norton, N. B.; William Delucry, Mouth of Keswick, N. B. were other first place winners and prominent exhibitors.

GUERNSEY CLASSES

The estate of Seymour Main and Son, Denismore Mills, N. B., won the premier breeders and premier exhibitors awards in Guernseys at the Maritime Winter Fair, Friday but probably the proudest man at the fair was Walter G. Coulter of Norton, N. B. This man brought his herd to the fair this year for the first time and he took home both the male and the female Guernsey championship. He also had several other top placings and a string of good runners. Position was Harold Palmer of Kensington was the top Prince Edward Island exhibitor and he made a good showing in what was termed the strongest competition in the Guernsey ring at Amherst for the first time. Palmer had three firsts, four seconds, two thirds, six fourths, one fifth and six sixths. Several of his wins were important ones. For example, he placed second Friday afternoon in a very large class for the best uddered Guernsey cow in the show. He was second in the progeny of dam and second in the sire and son of sire. Ernest F. Coles and Son of Aylesford, who had some placings in the heavy competition that developed the last day of the show.

Frank Saunders of Aylesford, president of the Canadian Guernsey Breeders Association, presented the premier breeders and premier exhibitors awards to a representative of the estate of Seymour Main and Son at the conclusion of the show.

The Guy Rodd trophy for the junior championship of Guernsey class was presented Friday night in the Bailey Arena to the winner, Owen Younker of Kings-ton. The trophy is donated by Mr. Rodd, whose Brackley farm herd at Brackley was one of the outstanding herds in Canada before he held his dispersal sale last year. Mr. Rodd retained four of his best heifers and is an ardent breeder in a smaller way than usual. The trophy was presented on Mr. Rodd's behalf by Neil Matheson, M.P., Southport, P.E.I. Mr. Rodd was at the fair for the show but left at noon on return to the Island. He leaves next week for the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto.

STRONG SHOWING

Prince Edward Island fur breeders made a strong showing in the closing stages of the show at the Maritime Winter Fair. The show clerk told The Guardian Friday evening that George A. Callbeck of Summerside had the largest number of points in the fox show and she said she was pretty sure, although she could not state officially until she made a final check, that Mr. Callbeck was the highest point winner in mink as well.

Premier Refers To Plans For New Program To Aid Prince County Farmers

—Speaking last night at the annual meeting of the East Prince Liberal Association held in Summerside, Premier A. W. Matheson said that as a result of the government's rural electrification program there are at the present time 583 new customers. The total number of signed customers requesting electrification in Prince Edward Island he said was 2773. He said also that since these figures had been given him that another eight miles had been added with an approximate number of 75 customers.

At the present time there are 60 1/2 miles of new line completed and he paid tribute to the Summerside electric plant which had completed 20 1/2 miles of this line. The balance had been completed by the Maritime Electric Company. Mr. Matheson said that every indication pointed to the fact that the program would be completed within the three years time in which it would be finished.

Dealing with the reduction of the provincial debt, he said it had been reduced by one half million within the last two years. "However," he went on, "this year there will be no reduction. I am telling you that now definitely because we have our rural electrification program which is a mental health center at Aylesford and that is going to cost a lot of money, and our road program this year has possibly been more extensive than any we have had so far."

Referring briefly to the proposed program in agriculture, the Premier said he would elaborate more on this at the meeting in Queen's County tonight. He outlined two recommendations which have been made to the government: that an office of the Department of Agriculture will be opened in Summerside where the representative may be stationed to better serve this county. He said this has been a long felt need and that in this office would be a hired stenographer who will be able to meet the public and discuss their problems.

Lowell Hancock, showing for the Ohio National Ranch at Summerside, had three grand championship ribbons, eight firsts and numbers of other lesser placings. John MacInnis of Breton's Cove, N.S., had the best breath of spring fox at the show. J. F. Comeau of Little Brook, N.S., had the best female. James Jodrey of Northport, N.S., and W. Jamieson, St. Stephen, N.B. were others who had high placings in this type of mink.
