

# Injuries Plague Two Top Players In Tennis Tourney

VANCOUVER (CP) — Two seeded players fell by the wayside Tuesday in men's singles play at the Canadian tennis championships, either unseated outright or hobbled badly by injuries.

Paul Willey of Vancouver, third-ranked Canadian singles player, succumbed to a bad leg and a flaccid toothed university student in a marathon third-round singles match.

Australian Bob Howe, 33-year-old schoolteacher from Sydney who had recently beaten the world's best in mixed doubles play at Wimbledon, scratched out of men's singles and doubles and mixed doubles competition. He had hoped at one time to make men's doubles play, but found by game time that he wasn't fit enough.

His problem was an attack of bursitis—a inflammation of the right shoulder joint that knocked him out of the Washington State championships last week and, despite treatment under specialists, crippled him badly in his first singles match here Monday.

"I know I can't play singles with the shoulder the way it is," he said in announcing his withdrawal. "I hope by relying on my underarm strokes that I'll be able to stick to the doubles."

## Irish Timothy Goehagen To Appear On Local Mat Card

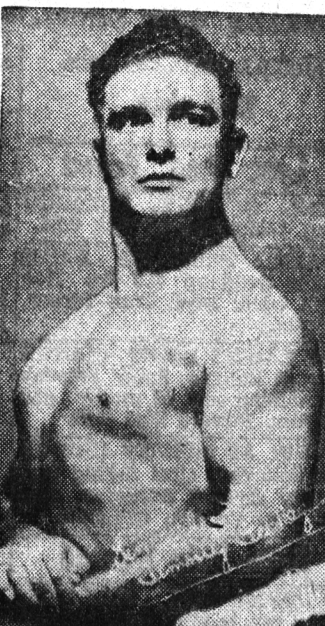
In his travels he says he has spent some \$5,000 for books and has read at least 3,500.

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## Is Lost To Cubs For A Month

CHICAGO (AP) — Pitcher Moe Drabowsky will be lost to Chicago Cubs for the next month—a time or dire need for hurling strength to keep in the National League pennant race contention.

A torn muscle in the elbow cap of Drabowsky's right arm—the hurling arm—has played hob with the 23-year-old player's effectiveness.

John Holland, the Cubs' vice president, said Tuesday it will take 30 days of rest to get him back in form.

The club will decide in Pittsburgh whether to put Drabowsky on the injured list.

The Cubs are now six games behind Milwaukee Braves and San Francisco Giants, and sidelining Drabowsky would leave the roster one short.

The injury was suffered July 11 during a game lost, 7-2, to Pittsburgh, when Drabowsky pitched 4 2-3 innings, allowing five runs on three hits and five walks.

He missed one turn while taking physical therapy, then tried again against Milwaukee July 19, but lasted only one third of an inning.

The Cubs signed Drabowsky for a sizable bonus in July, 1956. He was then with the Halifax and District League. His record last year was 19-15, and he looked like one of the National League's better hurlers during the last half of the year.

Manager Bob Scheffing had freely predicted 20 wins for Drabowsky this season on the basis of last year's showing.

## Indians Stagger Orioles; Pirates Shade Baby Bears

CLEVELAND (AP)—Gary Bell scattered eight hits Tuesday night and Russ Nixon drove in three runs with a homer and single as Cleveland Indians defeated Baltimore Orioles 9-4.

Billy Harrell opened the Cleveland first inning with a home run off Bill Pappas. Following a one-out single by Gary Geiger, who had three hits, Nixon slammed his homer to give the Tribe a 3-0 lead.

Baltimore got back two of the runs in the third inning. Al Piliuk walked, and Bob Nieman and Gene Woodling hit back-to-back doubles.

The Indians made it 6-2 in the fifth with another three-run outburst.

Baltimore added two runs off Bell in the eighth on Joe Ginsburg's homer after a single by Woodling.

CINCINNATI (AP) — Third baseman Ray Jablonski, a Cincinnati Redleg castoff, belted a two-run homer in the ninth inning Tuesday night that sank the Reds 4-3 and boosted the winning San Francisco Giants into the National League lead.

The loss was a costly one for the Braves who again fell out of first place in the National League when San Francisco Giants beat Cincinnati 4-3. Milwaukee, trailing the Giants by a full game, also saw Jay taken out of the game because of a strained right elbow.

The 22-year-old righthander, bidding for his seventh victory and sixth in a row, was charged with his fourth defeat.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Rookie Dick Stuart sparked a four-run rally Tuesday night with a bases-loaded triple in the fifth inning as Pittsburgh Pirates came from behind to defeat Chicago Cubs 6-4.

Rookie righthander Johnny Briggs, who had allowed the Pirates only one hit until the fifth suffered his first loss against four victories.

Ernie Banks' 28th home run with Lee Walls on base came in the fourth for Chicago.

Bob Friend received credit for his 13th victory against 11 defeats, but needed help.

MONTREAL (CP) — Columbus outfielder Jim Pendleton spoiled the fun for a lot of Montreal pitchers Tuesday as the Jets defeated Montreal Royals 4-3 and 7-2 in an International League doubleheader.

Pendleton won the first game by lashing a two-run single in the third inning of the seven-inning opener, then went four for four to lead the Jet's attack in the nightcap, his hits including a one-run triple.
