## PARLIAMENT OF CANADA

Clark Wallace and the Redoubtable Tarte.

WALLACE MAKES A DECIDED HIT.

THE SENATES ANSWER TO GOVERNMENT THREATS.

Demands an Enquiry at Once.

OTTAWA, June 29.—In the House of Commons yesterday, a spirited discussion took place on concurrence on the item of \$157,000 for the lease of the Intercolonial extension for one year.

Hon. Mr. Foster argued against the modified programme.

Mr. Clarke Wallace carried on the debate and brought Mr. Tarte to his feet by reference to Greenshields and Tarte's notes that have been about and also to Tarte's statement that Greenshields had been acting with him in financial matters connected with the purchase of the La Patrie newspaper.

Tarte created another scene by dancing about the House demanding an enquiry right away into all the matters charged against him. He said that if Clarke Wallace was a man and not a coward he would accept the challenge.

Mr. Wallace said he was not terrified by Tarte's hysterics. He believed there was an enquiry called for in another place which would perhaps determine whether Tarte was as innocent as he professed to be. As to his own cowardice Mr. Wallace said he never started the prosecution of a man who made charges against him and then got out of the province when the suit commenced. The item passed after further protests by Dr. Sproul and Mr. McLean.

Mr. McDonald (P. E. I.) objected to the whole course of the Government making large increases in the expenditure.

After recess Hon. Mr. Blair said that as the original programme of a 99 years lease had fallen through, he had concluded to reduce the vote for additional rolling stock from \$100,000 to \$50,000.

Concurrence was then completed and the supply bills were read a first time.

The House then went into committee on railway subsidies.

In the Senate Senator Miller resumed the discussion of his motion for an enquiry into the Drummond Railway matter. He said that he thought the enquiry should proceed at once.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell said that he had been induced on Saturday to accede to the Government's request to delay the enquiry till next session. But after the challenge of the Minister of Railways in the other chamber and the utterances of organs of the Government at Montreal and Toronto which declared that the Government dared not press inquiry lest Conservatives be implicated he concluded that the investigation should go on at once. If the Conservatives were corruptly implicated, he, for one, wanted to see them exposed and punished. It was useless for Liberals to hold out such threats.

Senator Power expressed the opinion that the proposed enquiry was within the Senate's power, but thought that the House of Commons was the proper place for it. He condemned the Globe for its suggestion.

Senator Primrose repudiated the idea that this was a fishing idea, though it might discover some fishy transactions. He regretted to hear that a fire in the offices of the Drummond Railway had destroyed some records.

Senator Miller's motion was carried. The Senate will organize today if the enquiry goes on this session.
