## Edmonton Mayor Is Disqualified

EDMONTON (CP)—For the second time in six years Mayor William Hawrelak of Edmonton is out of office because of land deals involving the city.

In a written judgment by Chief Justice C. C. McLaurin of the Alberta Supreme Court, Mr. Hawrelak was disqualified Thursday from holding office.

The mayor, in a statement issued through his lawyer five hours after the judgment was released, said he plans on immediate appeal.

Chief Justice McLaurin declared Mr. Hawrelak had violated the City Act in a business transaction involving a company in which the mayor held 40 per cent interest. The City Act limits the interest of an

## New Division In NHL Surprise To Rocket

MONTREAL (CP)—Maurice (Rocket) Richard said Thursday the announcement of a new NHL division came as a "surprise" and he didn't think it could be completed quickly.

"If they're going to have two divisions it would be a good idea to have one out West and one in the East which could play together at the end of the season," said the former Canadiens star who is assistant to club president David Milson.

Richard said he didn't think a second division would be up to current NHL standards for at least four or five years, and therefore a partially interlocking scheduled would not work well immediately.

"It will take a while before another division is good enough to play the present teams," he said.

Richard retired from hockey in 1960.

**PREDICTION MADE**

He predicted the proposed second division would play some exhibition games with the present NHL clubs and perhaps take part in playoffs at the end of each season until they're strong enough to take part in regular season schedules.

Commenting on the NHL proposal to make sufficient players on the present teams available to the new division to make it competitive from the start, he said:

## RCMP Inspector Joseph Carriere Gets Promotion

OTTAWA (CP)—RCMP Inspector Joseph Carriere, 53, one of the central police figures in the Dorion judicial inquiry, has been promoted to superintendent, Commissioner George B. McClellan announced Thursday.

The promotion was one of four, all retroactive to Feb. 1, 1965.

Supt. Carriere was the man who took a statement in Montreal last August from lawyer Pierre Lamontagne alleging that Raymond Denis had offered a \$20,000 bribe to get Mr. Lamontagne to agree to the release on bail of Lucien Rivard.

Rivard, arrested earlier in Montreal and wanted in the United States on a narcotics charge, has since escaped from Bordeaux Jail in Montreal. He still is at large.

Supt. Carriere, a native of Hull, Que., who first joined the force in 1929, has been assistant officer in charge of criminal investigation in "C" Division since 1962.

## Mammoth Bones 12,000 Years Old

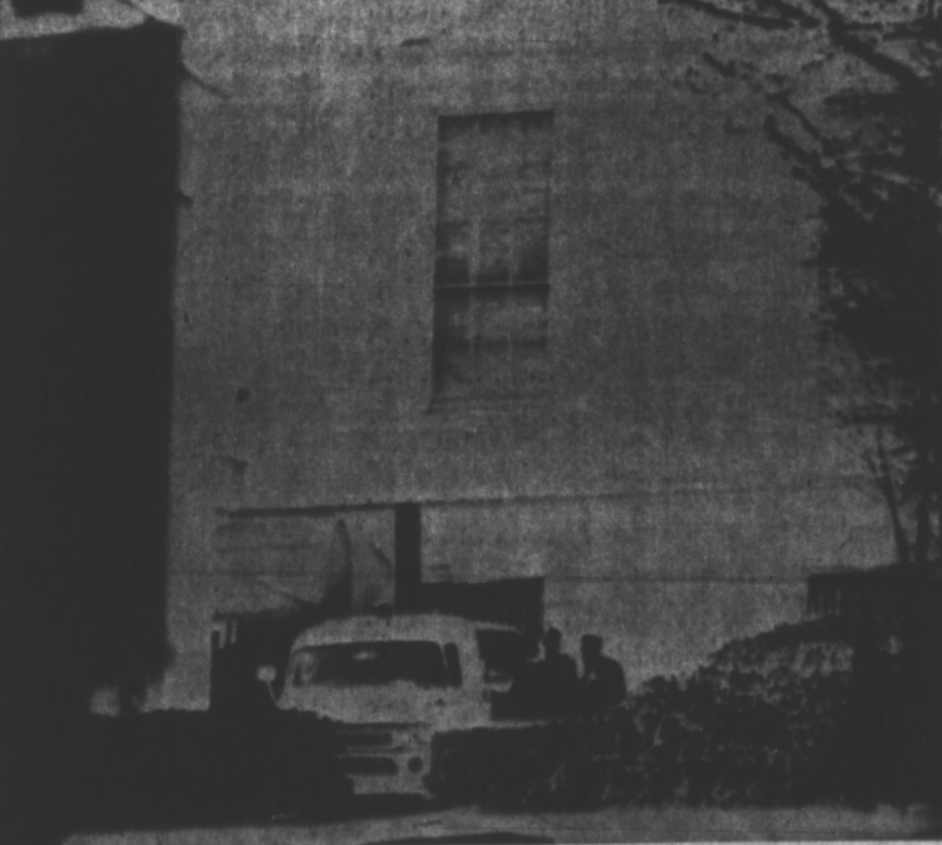
SASKATOON (CP)—Bones of a Mammoth found on a highway construction site at Kyle, Sask., are about 12,000 years old, a University of Saskatchewan scientist said Thursday after a carbon analysis dating process which lasted six months.

Dr. K. J. Mccallum was in charge of the work, which required almost a pound of bone from the elephant-like animal's skeleton.

POMPANO BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Home runs by Elston Howard and Mickey Mantle gave New York Yankees an early lead in the first Florida exhibition baseball game Thursday but it took a wild pitch by Washington's Pete Richert to give them a 4-3 victory over the Senators.

A standing room only crowd of 4,108, largest in the Senator's five years here, overflowed into the outfield.

Howard homered in the first inning, Mantle, batting leadoff, clouted one over the fence in right-center following Tony Kuback's single in the third. Both were off Benjie Daniels.

The Yankees scored the winning run in the fourth on Bobby Richardson's double and infield out and Richert's wild pitch.

## Present System Is Hypocritical

MONTREAL (CP)—David Molson, president of the Montreal Canadiens, says the present basis for deciding world amateur hockey supremacy "is completely hypocritical."

He said in a speech Wednesday to the Montreal Advertising Sales Club that "the day must come" when Canada will have to use her best players—National Hockey League professionals—if this country is to regain world hockey prestige.

"Make no mistake about it. European teams are as professional as any team in the NHL. In my opinion, until this is recognized, our hockey image around the world will continue to suffer."

He said great progress had been made in the last few years in assembling Canada's national hockey team. "However under present conditions, we are not being realistic."
