**Local and Other Items.**

**DIPHTHERIA.**—There is an epidemic of diphtheria in the vicinity of Kentville. The schools are closed.

**WINTER QUARTERS.**—The British cruisers Talbot and Pallas, which reached Halifax last week, have been ordered to winter quarters in the West Indies.

**A SING SUM.**—The North Sydney Herald says that over \$83,000 have been expended in the erection of new buildings in that town during the past six months.

**MRS WEBBER ILL.**—A Danforth, Me., letter says: Mrs H Price Webber has been quite ill at the hotel for nearly two weeks. She is fast recovering and expects soon to be able to join her company.

**BACK FROM THE KLONDIKE.**—Daniel Robertson, of Big Island, Pictou, arrived home last week from the Klondyke. A gentleman from down there said that he brought out \$10,000 in gold dust, and left behind him claims worth as much.

**MORE EXPECTED.**—Montreal millionaires appreciate their mission in life. It is now said that Mr W C Macdonald, who has already given \$2,000,000 to McGill University, will probably give another \$25,000 to the electrical department of the science building.

**A RAILWAY SQUABBLE.**—It is reported that work on the Midland railway between Truro and Mansland, in Nova Scotia, is suspended pending the settlement of a squabble between the politicians as to whether the line should be built via Clifton or Brookfield. The delay will probably prevent the completion to Truro this year.

**NEW SHOE FACTORY.**—A Yarmouth, N S, capitalist is said to be about to erect a large boot and shoe factory in that town. The building will be three stories in height and work will be begun immediately. Such an enterprise will be of great benefit to the town and will be the means of furnishing employment to a large number of persons.

**A FIRM MARKET.**—There has been a very firm market in England for Canadian oats owing to the scarcity of Russian parcels, says a London cable. No 2 and 1 white Canadian have sold at 16s 6d to 17s 3d c i f, prompt shipment. If Russia continues to hold back her oats, we shall have to depend more upon Canada and the United States during the winter.

**NO MINERALS IN LABRADOR.**—Further confirmation of absence of mineral deposits on Labrador shore has been received. Two prospectors returned this week and reported at Halifax. Both men are practical miners and remained in the country until compelled to leave by the cold season. They covered more ground than any other parties. Heavy granite deposits were found everywhere.

**HONESTY.**—If a business man honestly believes he has honest goods, is selling at an honest profit and advertises them honestly he is sure of convincing the honest public and this will help him to do business with honest people. Incidentally such advertising will catch the trade of a great many who are perhaps not so particularly honest but who appreciate the way he tells about the things he has confidence in.

**GUNNERS WANTED.**—For some time past advertisements have appeared in the London papers offering the most liberal inducements to first-class time-expired gunners for service abroad. It transpires that the Chinese government is the advertiser. The Chinese have a number of new warships on the stocks, but there are no experienced men to man them. The men are offered high wages for three years' service, free passage to and from China, and sole charge of gunnery batteries, so long as they can train the natives to a state where they can cope with European soldiers or sailors. It is said however that the British admiralty don't like this, and will take measures to block it, which can be done under the British Foreign Enlistment Act, forbidding foreign powers to recruit in Britain.

**Montreal Star:** The most remarkable feature of the international squabble has been the manner in which English statesmen of both parties forced the fighting. We may take it for granted that it was not through mere impulse, or mere coincidence that so many prominent British statesmen adopted such an unusually bellicose attitude. The most probable explanation is that they regarded war with France inevitable within a few years if the African question were permitted to remain in issue, and they saw no reason to wait for France and Russia to prepare for the struggle. Nobody suspects any of these statesmen of desiring war with France for the sake of war, of glory, or of conquest; but a purely defensive policy is not inconsistent with a due recognition of the importance of choosing the time as well as the place for a fight.
