Glouce Bay. Two years ago he was
bought from Rollie Wood by

Harold Cudmore, who has
brought him along carefully and
he is now recognized as a pos-
sible future 2:10 trotter. Just
look at his breeding... by Peter
Astra 2:01 1/2 by Peter Volo 2:02.
Peter Astra was leading colt
trotter and the greatest four-
year-old in America in his rac-
ing days for the late Dr. H. M.
Marshall. Arionway's dam was
Arion Girl 2:02 1/2 by Arion Guy
1:59 1/2 and she is the dam of
Volarian 2:03 1/2, Mighty Boy 3:
2:05 and two others better than
2:10. Her sire, Arion Guy, was
one of the world's greatest trot-
ters and the first trotter that
Tommy Murphy beat 2:00 with.
With the above ancestry it is not
improbable that our future hopes
of 2:10 for Harold's trotter will
be realized.
