

# Early Settlement Outlook Dims in Producers' Strike

MONTREAL (CP) — The striking television and radio producers at CBC Montreal announced Thursday they intend to request immediate intervention by Labor Minister Starr or Prime Minister Diefenbaker in a bid to end the 10-day dispute.

The announcement came during a day of fast-breaking developments, few of which seemed likely to bring quick settlement to the strike which has crippled live French-language broadcasting by the CBC in Montreal.

The statement issued by the Producers' Association charged that the CBC "after having given the impression that it wished a settlement of the actual conflict has refused this afternoon to negotiate officially with the producers."

### CHARGE CBC BALKS

The CBC would meet representatives of the producers, the statement said, but balked at official negotiation.

This statement was followed up in short order by another complaining that the CBC has spent \$3,200 sending telegrams to all employees informing them that they were not to be paid while remaining off work. It said the CBC sent the telegrams when it knew another proposal from the producers was forthcoming.

The second statement set forth the producers' position. It reiterated their demand for recognition

of their newly formed Association des Realisateurs (CCCL) as official bargaining agent.

It declared the producers ready to abandon all privileges that might impede recognition on a management basis according to the federal labor code.

### MAIN OBJECTION

The CBC's main objection to recognition was its claim that the producers are part of management.

The producers want recognition before returning to work. The CBC wants them to return to work with the promise to study the matter of recognition.

The CBC notified the producers Thursday that their contracts have been declared null and void. The 74 producers were under individual contracts with the corporation. A spokesman said earlier about 22 of the contracts, of one or two-year duration, have expired.

The CBC said the producers' absence from work was unauthorized and they had therefore repudiated their contracts. They were advised in separate telegrams.

### TORONTO DIRECTIVE

Notices were also sent to each union member who has honored the producers' picket lines telling them that their absence from work since the strike began 10 days ago has been unauthorized and they are therefore entitled to no pay since that time.

"The CBC spokesman said it is still too early to judge whether members of unions connected with the Canadian Council of Authors and Artists (CCL) will obey a directive from Toronto headquarters of the CCAA ordering them to return to work through the producers' picket lines.

Jean Duceppe, Montreal president of the Union des Artistes, urged his membership to continue to honor the picket line.

Meanwhile on the radio side Ken Withers, program director for CBM radio, said 18 English-language announcers had decided to defy their local union, obey their national union and return to work.

In Ottawa Claude Jodoin, president of the Canadian Labor Congress, called a meeting for today with heads of seven CLC unions representing CBC employees in connection with the Montreal strike.

Mr. Jodoin said only that he has some ideas to put forward. About 2,000 of the CBC's 2,500 Montreal employees have been of the job since Dec. 29. But French- and English-language radio and television has been kept on the air by about 350 management, supervisory and confidential staff members.

English-language television has been affected to a lesser extent.

## Liquor Charge Brings \$40 Fine

SUMMERSIDE — A Wellington man charged with possession of liquor at a place other than his residence was fined \$40 and costs when he appeared before Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C., in magistrate's court Thursday.

An Alberton man appeared to face a charge arising out of the Excise Act but due to the illness of defence counsel the case was further adjourned, to Jan. 20th. The case had been commenced in October.

The court learned that an Emerald man, for whom a bench warrant had been issued, had voluntarily appeared at the RCMP office entered a written plea of guilty to a charge of driving without an operator's licence and was fined \$5 and costs.

## Appeals Of Stanley Bridge, Frenchfort Men Are Upheld

Daniel MacLeod of Stanley Bridge won an appeal when he appeared before Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan in Appeals Court yesterday.

Defence counsel Allison Gillis based his appeal on the fact that a plea of guilty to a charge of

driving while impaired had been accepted by a lower court but was not noted it was the second such charge against the accused.

The accused had been charged with drunken driving but a plea of guilty to the lesser charge was accepted by Magistrate K.M. Martin in police court July 14, 1958. It was after conviction on the lesser charge that Mr. Martin asked to have a look at MacLeod's record.

MacLeod was sentenced to 14 days in Queen County Jail. Mr. Justice MacGuigan granted the appeal, and MacLeod was fined \$100 and costs.

In Appeals Court Tuesday Leo F. Duggan of Frenchfort was granted an appeal by Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy. The accused had been convicted in police court last August on a charge of having care and control of a motor vehicle while his ability was impaired.

Duggan and his brother Charles of Bedford, took the witness stand. Charles Duggan admitted to a bottle of shine found in the truck belonged to him. He said they left the truck and left the keys in the ignition and when they returned his brother suggested they sleep for a while until the effects of the liquor wore off.

City police discovered both men asleep in the truck with the keys still in the ignition about 1 a.m.

Defence counsel Lester F. O'Donnell, cited a number of such cases from Canadian Criminal Law publications where similar circumstances resulted in dismissal of the case.

Another appeal scheduled for Tuesday, Orville Roberts charged with driving while impaired was adjourned until Jan. 16th.

## Mars, Venus Landings Scoffed At By Briton

LONDON (Reuters)—Dr. Richard Woolley, Britain's astronomer royal who once described interplanetary travel as "utter bilge," scoffed Thursday at the idea of a landing on Venus or Mars.

He was commenting about a statement attributed to Soviet Prof. Anatoli Blagonravov that Russia might try to land a manned rocket on Venus or Mars later this year.

"If they get to Venus they will find it is boiling hot," Woolley said. "If they get to Mars they will find it freezing cold. "On neither planet will they be able to breathe. The best of luck to them."

In Moscow, a spokesman for the Soviet Academy of Science, who said he had conferred with Blagonravov on the matter, denied that the expert had said the Russians were training a man for space flight.
