

IN MEMORIAM

MR. GEORGE J. MORROW

A tribute to the late George J. Morrow by an old friend and neighbor, James E. Dingwell, North Lake, P.E.I.

It is seldom that a man of shy disposition and retiring nature is so widely known, respected and mourned as George J. Morrow, born at North Lake, P. E. I., on August 7th, 1889, the son of the late Elisha B. and Miriam Garrett Morrow.

As a child he developed rapidly, and by reason of strength and willingness to work, he early took an active part and assisted his father in caring for their productive farm, until the death of the latter many years ago.

As the farm help became harder to obtain, he kept less live stock, but still maintained the farm's fertility, and in off crop years was able to supply others with hay and other necessary crops, and there, perhaps, was laid the keystone in the arch of a life that is worthy of emulation. He did not follow the usual custom, "highest price, easiest disposal", but was always willing to accept much less than the highest market price, thus making what he considered their taking value. He also had an unerring knowledge of those in want, and though a busy man, spent much time in attending to their needs. It thus follows, that a man with such lofty principles carried them into all of his activities.

The home which was maintained for several years after his father's death by him and his mother was near to a fishing centre and a prosperous farming community at all hours, and regardless of station, class or creed were warmly welcomed and fed in the good old-fashioned manner.

Mr. Morrow never married and shortly after his mother's death, he sold the farm and moved to Madell and resided with his sister, Jennie, then Mrs. Freeman Bowley. In the course of time, Mr. Bowley died, and Mrs. Bowley resumed teaching school and was re-married to Mr. Peter Cameron of Charlottetown. George still continued to reside at Midgell, and bought part of the farm owned by his nephew Mr. Hudson Bowley, but still made his home with his nephew and namesake George Bowley.

The residential move did not change his sturly character, for there too, by his friendly disposition and willingness to help anyone to whom he could be of any service in time of need, he won the love and respect of neighbors far and near.

It was my privilege to visit him last August, and shortly after his health began to fail, and in late December he entered the P.E.I. Hospital where he spent a few weeks. Seemingly to improve, he came out to the home of his sister, Mrs. Peter Cameron, where for a short time hopes for recovery gladdened his family and friends, but soon to their disappointment the serious nature of his illness was indicated.

On March 16th he re-entered the hospital, where everything possible was done to alleviate his sufferings, but all to no avail, and he was visited by friends from East Point to Charlottetown and beyond, and while conscious of their presence, greeted them with his characteristic cheerfulness.

On May 12th, as the shadows of evening unselfish heart ceased to beat and he peacefully passed away to that Home where there is no more sickness, nor pain, nor death.

His remains were transferred to the Cutcliffe Funeral Home, from where, on May 14th, funeral service was conducted by Rev. M. D. Dunbar, who so frequently visited him during his illness and brought to him many words of comfort and cheer.

Mr. Dunbar read from John XIV, a favorite chapter of the deceased, and gave a message of comfort and hope to his loved ones. The choir of Central Christian Church, under the direction of Miss Thelma Burns, organist, kindly assisted in the singing of the hymns "Unto the Hills Around Do I Lift Up My Longing Eyes", and "Abide With Me".

After the service the remains were conveyed by hearse to the home of his nephew George Bowley, Midgell.

The pallbearers at Charlottetown were: Messrs. Aubrey MacPhail, Andrew MacEachern, Roy Bruce, Harry Bevan, George E. MacDonald and Harry Rapson.

On Thursday, May 15th his remains, followed by a large company of relatives and friends, were conveyed to Marie United Church where service was conducted by the pastor Rev. Russell MacLeod, who also spoke a message of comfort from John, chapter XIV.

The hymns sung were "Unto the Hills Around Do I Lift Up My Longing Eyes", and "Abide With Me". The choir under the direction of Mrs. Marion Anderson.

The pallbearers in Marie were: Renfrew Cameron, Fred Rose, Maynard Sanderson, T. R. Cullen, Marshall Peters, Bruce Webster, Flower bearers: Everett Webster, Walter Dingwell, J. D. MacEwen, Lloyd James, Harold Hunter and Wilbur Webster. Interment was in Midgell Cemetery.

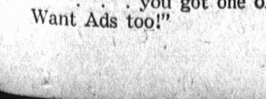
